## Secrecy Shrouds **Red Tactics**

J. Edgar Hoover, director of the FBI since 1924, emphasizes that the danger to the United States from master-Red plotters is as great as ever. In this week's installment of his book, "Musters of Decelt," Hoover takes the reader into a secret meeting of a communist club "somewhere in the U.S.," to show the methods of the leaders of the consparacy in keeping members busy on Party work and "in line."

Let's look in on a secret meeting of a communist club. I'm describing this particular meeting from the records because it is so typical of hundreds of such meetings of communist "clubs" or "cells."




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
