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Marine Midland Opens New Southside Office

The new Southside Office of Marine Midland Trust Company of Southern New York opened for business last Monday, May 26, according to J. Lawrence Kolb, senior vice president.

Prior to the opening for business of the new bank building, open house previews for the public were held on May 23 and 24. The official opening ceremonies took place May 25 with Mayor Edward A. Mooney and Burton O'Hara, president of the South Elmira Chamber of Commerce, Inc., present.

The new bank, located at the junction of S. Main St. and Pennsylvania Ave., is a compact, modern brick building with large areas of glass. The triangular corner plot, formerly occupied by a gas station and two houses, is completely blacktopped, providing space in front and in the rear of the bank for 23 cars.

Only those customers who have business inside the bank will need to use the parking facilities as the new bank is equipped with two drive-in windows at the rear of the bank. These windows will be operated during all regular banking hours and, in addition, will be open Saturdays from 9 a.m. until noon. Another new feature, a walk-up window facing South Main Street, will also be in operation Saturday mornings for pedestrians.

Moving operations were completed over the weekend. The old building and the present customer parking lot, which has been provided on a rental basis by the bank, will no longer be used. No plans for future use of the present bank building have been made.
