MONSIGNOR BYRNE, pastor at that time, has been the spiritual director of the P.T.A. since its founding. Monsignor Byrne expressed his appreciation for the worthwhile projects which the organization has carried out to improve the school. This included raising a large sum for the fund to rebuild the school after it burned on April 5, 1916.

Marine Midland Opens New Southside Office

The new Southside Office of Marine Midland Trust Company of Southern New York opened for business last Monday, May 26, according to J. Lawrence Kolb, senior vice president.

Prior to the opening for business of the new bank building, open house previews for the public were held on May 23 and 24. The official opening ceremonies took place May 25 with Mayor Edward A. Mosser and Burton O'Hara, president of the South Elmira Chamber of Commerce, Inc., present.

The new bank, located at the junction of S. Main St. and Pennsylvania Ave., is a completely modern brick building with large areas of glass. The triangular corner plot, formerly occupied by a gas station and two houses, is completely blacktopped, providing space in front and in the rear of the bank for 23 cars.

Only those customers who have business inside the bank will need to use the parking facilities. The new bank is equipped with two drive-in windows at the rear of the bank. These windows will be operated during all regular banking hours and, in addition, will be open Saturdays from 9 a.m. until noon. Another new feature, a walk-up window facing South Main Street, will also be in operation Saturday mornings for pedestrians.

Moving operations were completed over the weekend. The old building and the present customer parking lot, which has been provided on a rental basis by the bank, will no longer be used. No plans for future use of the present bank building have been made.

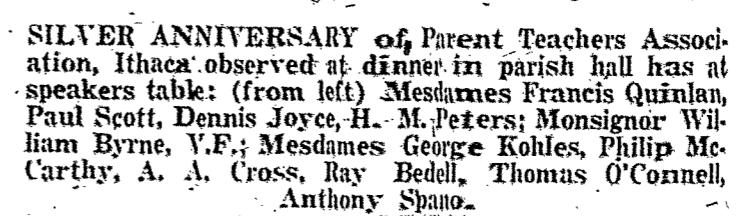
New Bank Office 'Light, Informal'

The interior of the new Southside Office of Marine Midland Trust Company of Southern New York presents a light, informal, modern appearance. The walls are painted antique white; the tellers' counters, the safe deposit booths, and the furniture are walnut.

The entire front wall, the side wall facing Pennsylvania Ave., and the entrance are of glass. Full length natural basswood draperies may be drawn to completely or partially cover the glass walls. The floor is carpeted in beige except for working areas where light colored vinyl tile is used.

Pleasing color contrast is added in certain wall sections which are gold-toned, and in the vivid persimmon upholstering of modern chairs which are at desks and in the inviting customers' corner where a low table and lamp add to the hospitable home-like atmosphere of the bank.
