OUR LORD SAID: My counsel to you is, make use of your best wealth to win yourselves friends, who, when you leave it behind will welcome you into eternal habitations. (Luke 16:9) You cannot take it with you! When you die you will be dismissed as steward of your possessions. When that day of bankruptcy comes all you can take with you is the good you have done and your merits. Only blessed savior therefore counsels that while we live we make friends with our money by helping the poor, the lepers, the hungry. Those helped here on this earth, become our helpers there on the day of our judgment.

AN ANGEL INFORMED CORNELIUS, the first Gentile convert, that his alms had come up before God as a memorial; he evidently had aided so many that he had a multitude of intercessors or pleaders for his conversion.

ST. PAUL WROTE TO Timothy charging the Christians of Ephesus: "Warn those who are rich in this present world not to think highly of themselves, nor to repose their hopes in riches that may fail us, but in the living God, who bestows on us so richly all that we enjoy. MRS. WILLIAM BERTSCH, outgoing guild president, said the organization's funds were obtained principally from an increase in membership, a card party and a fashion show, as well as numerous other activities. She reported guild membership at an all-time high of more than 2,900 persons.

Also donated to the Sisters during the last year were a gold luncheon and a Communion plate.
