Work Begins On New Wing For Junior College

Excavation work opening the construction of the new wing of the Mercy Sisters Motherhouse to be known as Catherine McAuley Junior College began this week on the Blossom Rd. property.

The extension of the Motherhouse will cost \$1,250,000 and will enlarge facilities for housing and training young Sisters of the community. The junior college, presently situated in the motherhouse, will provide each Sister with a full college course in teacher training under charter of the Education Department of the State of New York.

The new building will be the fruit of a construction (undisclosed) held last December and January as a climax to the 100th anniversary of the coming of the Sisters of Mercy to the Rochester diocese. A total of over \$500,000 was collected or pledged in the two months effort.

Charities Cited In Brotherhood Award To City

The Rochester diocesan Catholic Charities organization shared honors this week with a score of other civic groups to win the World Brotherhood Award for the City of Rochester.

The award formerly given only to individuals noted for their work in promoting international good will, was presented for the first time this year to a city as a whole.

ROCHESTER looked tops in the nation according to the World Brotherhood organization for its active role in strengthening the bonds of friendship among the world's peoples.

The Catholic Charities program was specifically cited for bringing over 2,000 refugees from Lithuania, Latvia, Hungary, Germany, Ukraine, Poland, Italy, China and Austria to find homes and work in the Rochester area.

At the time of the Hungarian revolt in October, 1956, the Catholic Charities promptly arranged to care for 400 refugees from that blood-drenched country.

An additional 78 Dutch people have also been settled here according to George W. Montgomery Jr., who aids Monsignor Arthur E. Rutigan, Charities' director, in arranging the relief program.

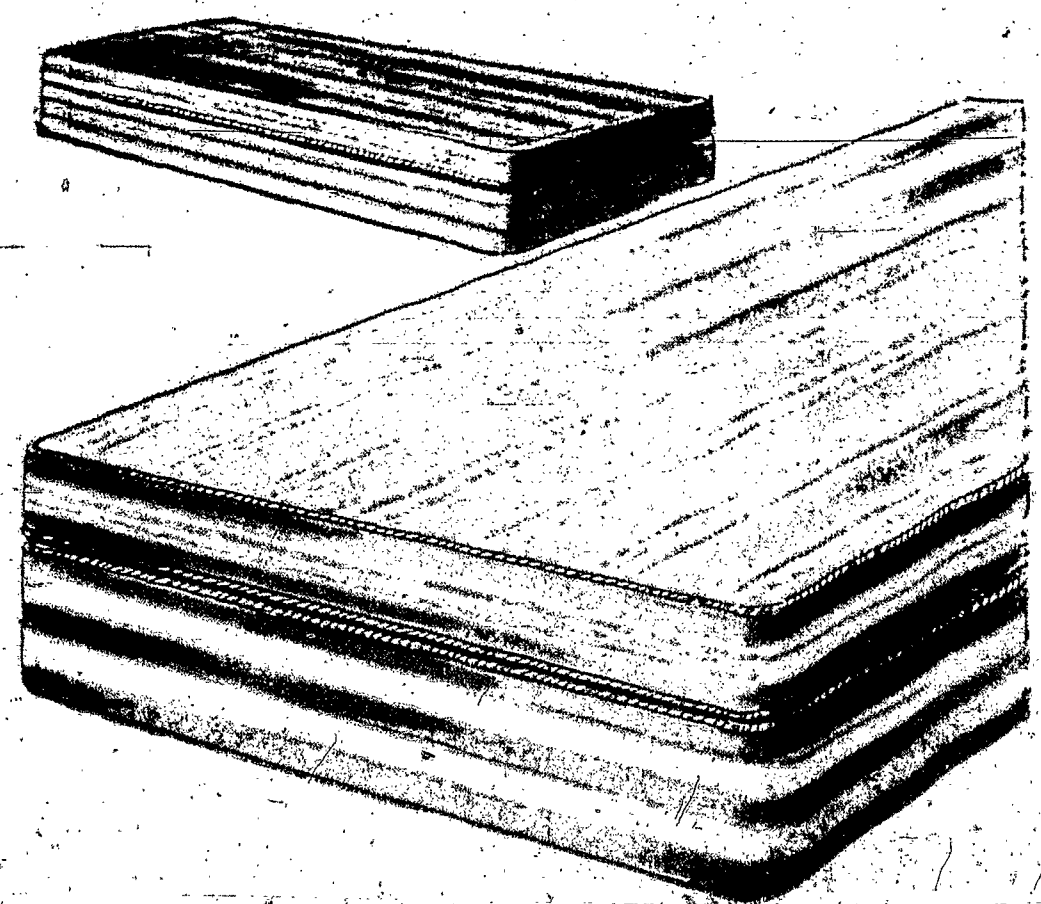
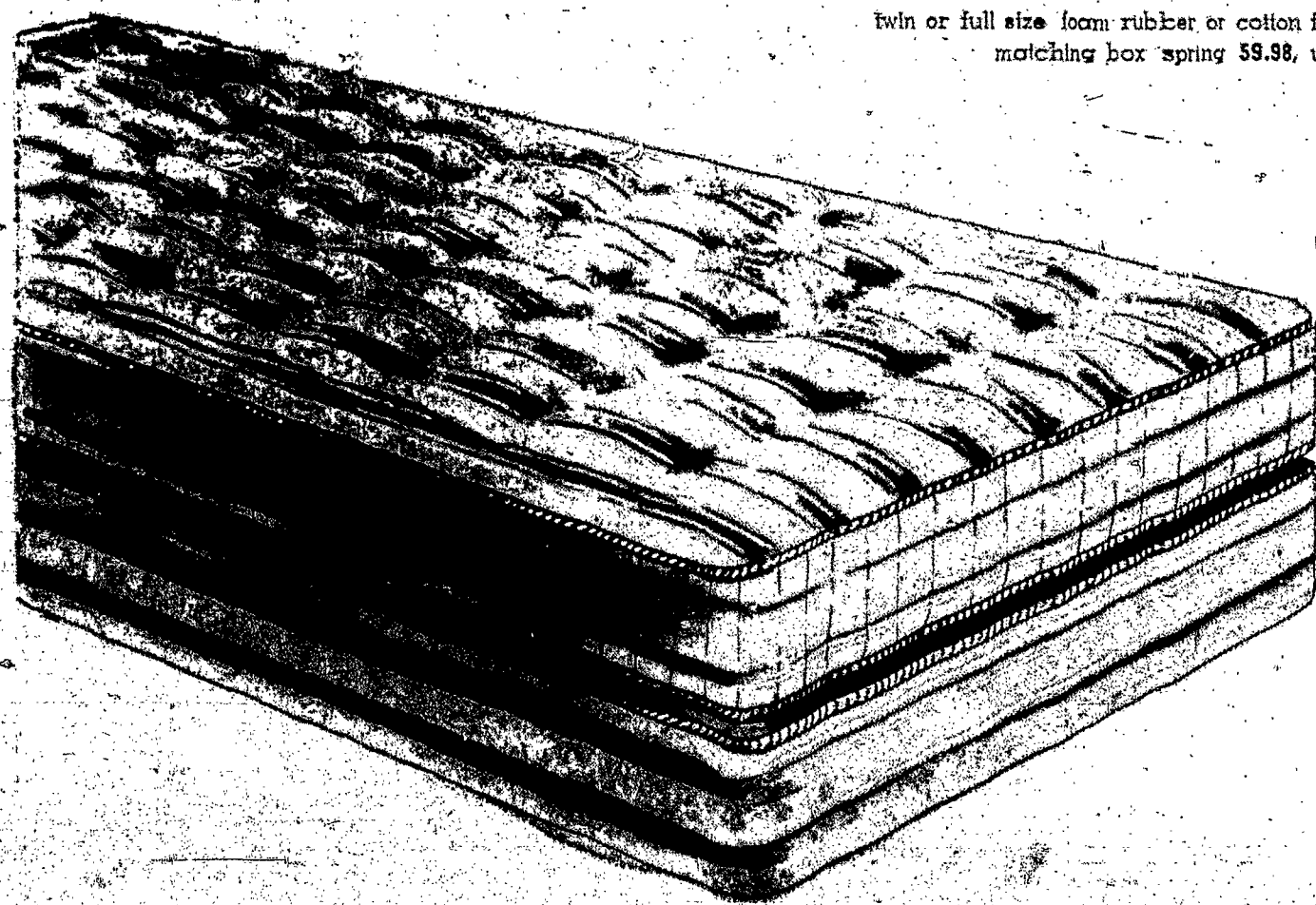
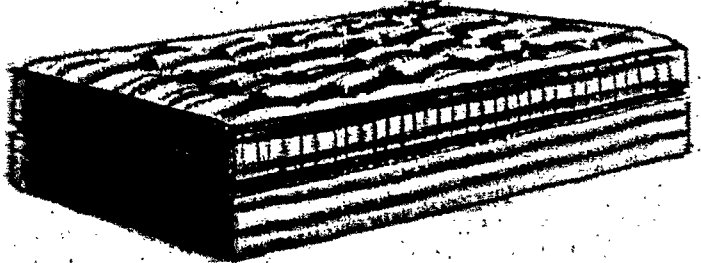
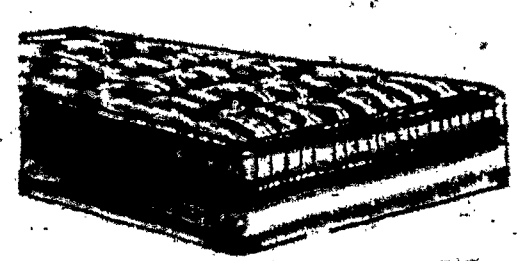
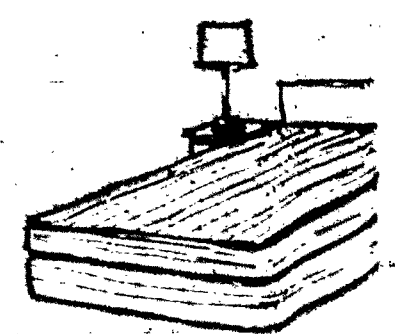
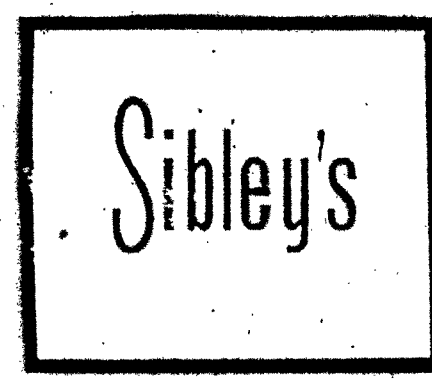
