

List Scholarships For St. Joseph's

St. Joseph's Hospital announced that one full and one partial scholarship to its School of Nursing will be granted in June. This is the sixth consecutive year that these awards have been offered. The full scholarship is for \$350 and the partial for \$175.

The awards are usually given to applicants, who are residents of Chemung County and who have been accepted for the Sept., 1958 class at St. Joseph's School of Nursing. The selection will be based on scholastic ability, personal qualifications for nursing, leadership ability and desire for financial assistance.

APPLICANTS awarded full scholarships agree to work for one year after completion of the nursing program on the general nursing staff of St. Joseph's Hospital for the regular staff salary. Applicants awarded the partial scholarships agree to work for six months after completion of the nursing program on the general staff of the hospital for the regular staff salary.

These annual awards are made possible through unrestricted donations to St. Joseph's Hospital. In addition to the two scholarships to be awarded by the hospital, four others sponsored by community organizations and administered by the School of Nursing will be granted to beginning students of nursing or students currently enrolled in the school.

A SCHOLARSHIP of \$300 will be awarded by Elmira Rotary Club; a \$400 scholarship will be awarded by Dunn Field Corporation; a \$300 scholarship will be awarded by Perry and Maxey Insurance, designated as a jubilee scholarship marking the 50th anniversary of the founding of the hospital. A 40/5 American Legion Scholarship completes the list of community organization awards ordinarily available to Chemung County residents who have been accepted for the Sept., 1958 nursing class at St. Joseph's.

A \$400 scholarship awarded by the medical staff of the hospital will be given to an applicant selected by the executive committee of the medical staff. This award will be granted to a resident of Chemung County who has been accepted for the September class at the nursing school.

Eligible applicants who have been accepted for the fall class at St. Joseph's and who are interested in availing themselves of these scholarships are requested to make application immediately to the director of nursing at St. Joseph's.
