'Round-The-Clock' Bank Deposit Service Available In Elmira

Customers of Southside Office, Marine Midland Trust Company of Southern New York will now be able to make deposits at any hour of any day or night throughout the year, including Sundays and holidays, according to George T. Snell, Assistant Vice President of the Southside Office.

This new policy of "the bank never being closed to its depositors" is the result of the installation of an ultra-modern night deposit system, a product of The Mosler Safe Co. of Hamilton, Ohio, the company which installed the vault doors and drive-in windows at the new bank.

The dual entrance unit of the day and night deposit system, through which deposits are made, is located on the South Main Street side of the building, next to the walk-up window. Mr. Snell explained it consists of a keyless slot into which sealed envelope deposits of checking or savings accounts are made. Bulkier deposits in locked bags are made into a hopper guarded by a locked rectangular steel door to which the customer has the key.

Each type of deposit is automatically transmitted downward through separate metal chutes into a burglary-resistant money safe located inside the bank where the deposits remain until removed by two of the bank's personnel. The two chutes contain ingeniously designed separate baffles to prevent outside withdrawal of either the envelope or bags from the receiving safe.

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
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
