**\$50,000 Plus 94 Men**

## St. Jerome's Builds A Convent

How do you build a convent? Well, if you are Father Roy B. Morphy, pastor of St. Jerome's Church, East Rochester, you raise \$50,000, collect 94 men from your parish, who will put in 7,500 hours of manual labor and in about six months time, your convent is built.

IT SOUNDS easy, doesn't it? But actually, it isn't that easy. In the latter part of last summer, Father Morphy was faced with a serious problem. The parish had bought property next to the school at 51 S. Garfield St. and he intended to house the Sisters of St. Joseph in an existing house on the property, after it was renovated.

This had to be done within a year's time, for the Sisters were living in the Nazareth Motherhouse, which was faced with an overcrowding problem.

Father called in several members of his parish in the building line to ask them whether the house could be renovated.

AFTER CAREFUL study, these men, chaired by Joseph Castro, a building contractor at 312 N. Lincoln Rd., East Rochester, told Father Morphy, that he would have to spend about \$30,000 for renovations. This, they thought, would take too much time, and in the end, would still not be completely satisfactory for the Sisters.

"So," Castro said, "we decided that we would enlist our friends in the parish and build a completely new convent — with not one cent being paid out for wages."

Plans for the new convent were drawn up by the architectural firm of Richard A. Stevens and Eugene M. Borish of 233 Goodman St. N., Rochester, at a very nominal cost.

EXCAVATION was begun on May 11, under the supervision of Castro, who counts among his workers about 20 men engaged in the building trade — plumbers, carpenters and heat experts. The rest of the 94? They are bank executives, accountants, a union local president, store clerks, truck drivers, etc.

Ever since the excavation, the men, ably assisted by Father John Hempel and Father Joseph Brennan, assistants at St. Jerome's, work every evening, Monday through Friday, from 6 to 9 p.m.

ON THE AVERAGE night, about 15 men turn out. Naturally, with all this back-breaking work, the men work up quite an appetite. So the priests of the parish provide them with coffee and sandwiches. The Sisters provide the men with moral support, with their prayers for the successful completion of the convent.

Castro said that the building would cost about \$50,000. "But if the men of the parish didn't donate their time, it would cost about \$125,000," he related.

While this work is being done, the six nuns who staff the school are still living at the Motherhouse on East Ave., through the kindness of Rev. Mother M. Helone, superior general.

In September, however, the Sisters will have to move to the old house on the convent property, temporarily, because of the overcrowded conditions at the Motherhouse. Sister M. William Margaret is principal of the school, which was completed in 1935.

WHEN COMPLETED, the convent will have a chapel, sacristy, two parlors, a refectory, community room, kitchen, sunporch and confessional on the first floor, and 12 bedrooms and a bath on the second floor.

The building is of frame construction with Roman brick veneer on the outside of the edifice. The building, which contains 2,500 square feet of living space, can be expanded, if necessary.

The basement contains a recreation room, laundry and drying area, a kitchen storage room and the boiler room, with hot water heating the building.

# Rochester Will Host Hibernians Convention

## Basilians To Move Novitiate

The novitiate of the Congregation of St. Basil, located at Aquinas Institute since the war years, will be moved to Pontiac, Michigan, in May, 1959, upon the completion of a novitiate to be built there.

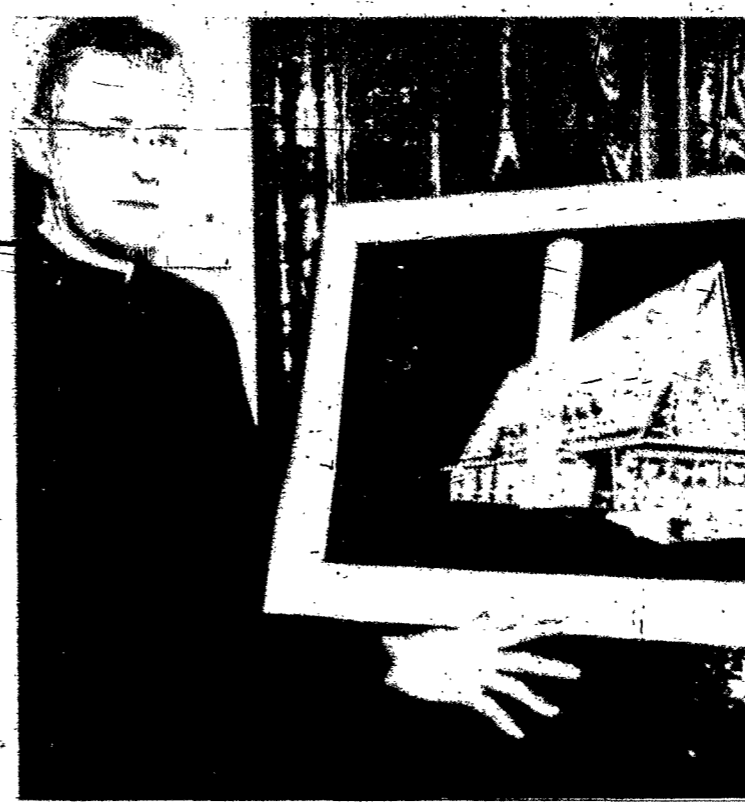
The Basilian Fathers have awarded the contract for the new Novitiate to the Schurrer Construction Co. of Pontiac and construction is now under way, according to Rev. Robert J. Scollard, C.S.B., secretary general of the society.

The new site was chosen because of its central location in regard to the Basilian houses in this country. Father F. J. Grescoviak, C.S.B., master of novices, said.

THE NEW Novitiate will have private rooms for 43 novices and 6 priests. It will be built in the center of an 80 acre farm, one of the highest points of land in the neighborhood of Detroit. The residence and refectory wings are functional in design, plain and austere.

The chapel features a floor to roof south window dedicated to the Blessed Virgin. May 1, 1959, has been set as the date for the transfer of the Novitiate. Total cost of the new building, will be \$750,000.

The building committee is headed by Rev. A. L. Higgins, C.S.B., Catholic Central High Schools for Boys, Detroit. Members of the Rochester local committee include Rev. John F. Murphy, C.S.B., president of St. John Fisher College and Rev. E. P. Magee, C.S.B., principal of Aquinas Institute.

Donald M. O'Callaghan, O. Carm, state chaplain of the A.O.H., will celebrate the Mass and be the speaker at the Communion Breakfast.

State president, Timothy J. Driscoll, will head a large delegation of New York City Hibernians attending the convention. A total of 500 Hibernians are expected from all parts of the state.

This year's meetings will be solemned by the loss of the Rev. Michael P. O'Brien of Rochester, former state chaplain and ardent Hibernian for years, who died suddenly on March 23 of this year.

Father O'Brien also was chaplain for Monroe County Board. Father George S. Wood, a classmate of Father O'Brien's, has since been appointed the new chaplain for the Monroe County Board.

His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Cussey will be the speaker at the state convention dinner on Saturday, June 28 at 7 p.m., which will close out the convention.
