German Nun Wins Degree At U of R

If you scanned down the lists of the graduates of the University of Rochester in the local paper Monday, you would have come across the name, Mother M. Regina Baumeister for Master of Arts degree.

Her question might have come into your mind, who is she? What religious order does she belong to?

Probing into these matters, you would find out that here is an unusual story. For Mother M. Regina belongs to the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary, a Bavarian, Germany order, that has two houses in this country, one of which is in Rochester.

Primarily a teaching order, these Sisters have a house at St. Bernard's Seminary, where the 12 Sisters do domestic work. Their other house in the U.S. is in Little Rock, Ark., where six Sisters conduct a private school.

But Mother Regina has an interesting story of her own.

BORN NEAR AUGSBURG, Germany, she has been a nun since 1928. In her 29 years as a nun, she has been primarily a teacher and school administrator. In fact, the Sisters of St. Bernard's are the only nuns in the order doing domestic work.

Sister Regina came to this country about two-and-a-half years ago and is superior of the order's Rochester house.

She was given the opportunity to study at the University of Rochester by Msgr. Wilfred T. Coughlin, F.A., rector of St. Bernard's Seminary, and she started work on her master's degree two years ago.

At the U. of R., Sister Regina majored in German literature and minored in Spanish.

"My experience at the university was most gratifying," Sister Regina said. "I studied under

St. Patrick's Seeks \$50,000

Victor Church To Build New Religion Center, Parish Hall

St. Patrick's Parish in Victor will conduct a fund campaign for the erection of a new Religious Training Center and Parish Hall, according to the announcement of the pastor, the Rev. E. Joseph Esser.

With a minimum goal of \$50,000, the campaign will seek three-year pledges from parishioners of the Victor church in a general solicitation slated for Sunday, June 29.

Present plans for the new parish center call for the start of construction in the late summer, said Father Esser. It will be erected on a newly acquired tract immediately next to the Victor Central School on High Street, he said.

The increase in parish youth receiving religious instruction under the "released-time" program has made it necessary to provide more adequate facilities for the operation of the religious education program, the pastor explained.

During the current year Father Esser has conducted weekly religion classes in the parish church for approximately 250 pupils from the Victor Central School.

THE NEW combination Religion Center and Parish Hall will feature prefabricated steel and fireproof construction. As designed by Cyril T. Tucker, architect of Rochester, it will provide three classrooms, kitchen and storage facilities and office space.

Acceleration-type partitions will make it possible to convert easily the entire classroom area into a large hall for parish meetings and social functions, Father Esser said.

ser explained in a special message to his parishioners.

Employment of the prefabricated steel construction, he noted, will result in a fifty per cent saving in costs and also provide convenience, safety and serviceability.

THE FUND DRIVE for the parish center will be undertaken by an 89-member committee of parish men under the chairmanship of Owen Keenan, included on the committee are: Donald

Butler, Frank Kucher, Bernard Ryan, William G. O'Brien, Mark Frame, John D. Colligan, Leonard Barry, Lawrence Keele and Frank Eisenmann. Other committeemen are being enlisted this week.

Preliminary meetings of the campaign committee are scheduled for June 18, and June 26. A General Committee Kick-Off Dinner will be held on June 28. Foley Associates, Inc., of Rochester are assisting in the direction of the drive.

Registration Opens For Reading Lab
