Graduation Exercises Held At St. James Hospital

Hornell—"The nurse is in partnership with God, the Creator, in caring for human life." His Excellency Bishop Kearney told members of the graduating classes of St. James Mercy Hospital School of Nursing and School of X-Ray Technology Sunday.

Bishop Kearney spoke at exercises at 4 p.m. in St. Ann's Church. He also presented diplomas to 15 graduates of the School of Nursing and two graduates of the School of X-Ray Technology.

"It is especially appropriate that nurses' graduating exercises be held in church because of the spiritual nature of the nursing vocation," Bishop Kearney told the group.

"EACH NURSE knows that the life or death of her patients ultimately depend upon the Will of God. There is almost no vocation so close to the hand of God as this one in which the nurses care for the bodies God has created.

"Among the beautiful titles applied to Christ, one of the best known is the 'Great Healer.' Where, then, could you find a more fitting place to begin your vocation than in His Presence?" the Bishop continued.

As each member of the class was introduced by the Rev. William H. Hickey, chaplain of St. James Mercy Hospital, she slowly approached the sanctuary where the Bishop presented her with a diploma from a gold-draped episcopal throne. The Bishop imparted the Pontifical Blessing to the graduates before they left the sanctuary.

THE GRADUATES, wearing their white uniforms and carrying arm bouquets of red roses were accompanied by Sisters of Mercy, student nurses, members of the nursing staff and students in the procession.

Music for the exercises was by St. Ann's Choir, under direction of Sister Mary Raymond Joseph with Miss Madeline Brohm as organist.

Solemn Benediction was celebrated by Bishop Kearney with the Rev. Joseph P. Haffey, pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola Church as deacon and Father Hickey, as subdeacon. The Rev. Vincent F. Collins, assistant pastor of St. Ann's, was assisting priest. During Benediction, the graduates recited a prayer that they might see Christ in each patient in their care.
