Manhattanville Commencement Graduates Hear Father Whalen

Rev. John S. Whalen, pastor of Our Lady of Mercy Parish, Greece, was the baccalaureate speaker at the commencement exercises of the Manhattanville College of the Sacred Heart, Purchase, N. Y. this June.

Father Whalen's niece, Judith Whalen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis A. Whalen Sr. of 375 Pinecrest Dr., was among the 122 graduates. The commencement address was given by Thomas E. Murray, consultant to the joint committee on atomic energy.

FATHER WHALEN told the graduates that they "stood on the threshold of the greatest change in your life to date." He further said that "you very definitely have many obligations and responsibilities that result from the process of education and to all these groups who have given so much to produce what you are and what you should be."

"It is your responsibility to do everything possible for your own sanctification and the sanctification of others," Father Whalen said. "This is your supreme obligation no matter what field of life you are planning to enter."

He told the graduates that by staying close to the spiritual things of life rather than the material, will bring real happiness, in spite of any material hardship, disappointment or sorrow. "I promise you," he concluded, "as the promise of God Himself, the crowning success of any life of moral men: the salvation of your immortal soul."

Father Butler Gets Doctorate
Rev. Ignatius W. Butler, T.O.R., son of Mr. and Mrs. William F. Butler 637 Post Ave. received his doctorate in the field of Sacred Theology from Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., on June 8.

Father Butler's dissertation, written as a partial fulfillment for the degree, was published recently. It is entitled "The Moral Problems of the Theatre." Father Ignatius wrote his dissertation under the direction of Very Rev. Francis J. Connell, C.S.S.R., noted educator and theologian.

During the past year Father Butler has been stationed at the Francis Xavier Motherhouse, Loreto, Pa. He taught moral theology at St. Francis Seminary and a marriage preparatory course at St. Francis College.
