### Sweepstakes Winner Gives \$10,000 To Church

The "Luck of the Irish" is still riding high. You can take that from Alice M. Murphy of Waldwick, N.J., and her uncle, Father Donald J. Murphy, pastor of St. Pius X Church in Rochester.

Sometime last March Miss Murphy bought a ticket on the Irish Sweepstakes and—as luck would have it—her ticket was on Tiber, the horse that finished second in the world famous sweepstakes.

All told, Miss Murphy, a 23-year-old nurse at St. Joseph's Hospital, Patterson, N.J., collected \$50,000, a pretty good return on a \$2.50 investment. As soon as she received the money, she took a plane trip to Rochester to see her uncle, who is currently building a school for his comparatively new parish.

SENCE CHARITY begins at home, Miss Murphy donated \$10,000 of her winnings to Father Murphy—the largest single contribution toward the construction of the new 12-room school house.

"I didn't ask her to donate the money," Father Murphy said. "It was just out of her own generosity that she did so."

When Miss Murphy was told

about her good fortune, she didn't believe it. "I thought it was a practical joke," she said.

The money was deposited in a Newark, N. J. bank, requiring only her signature to get it. "But I couldn't get off work to go to the bank," Miss Murphy said. "When the hospital administration found out about it, they rushed in a replacement for me—then they gave me an hour to go to the bank."

NOT ONLY did Miss Murphy contribute money to the school building collection, but she was called upon to do some of the work in the school's construction.

Shortly after her arrival in Rochester, she was given the honor of turning over the first spadeful of earth, symbolizing the official start of the edifice.

Plans for the money? At present she hasn't decided. "I don't know how much I have left after taxes, which will take more

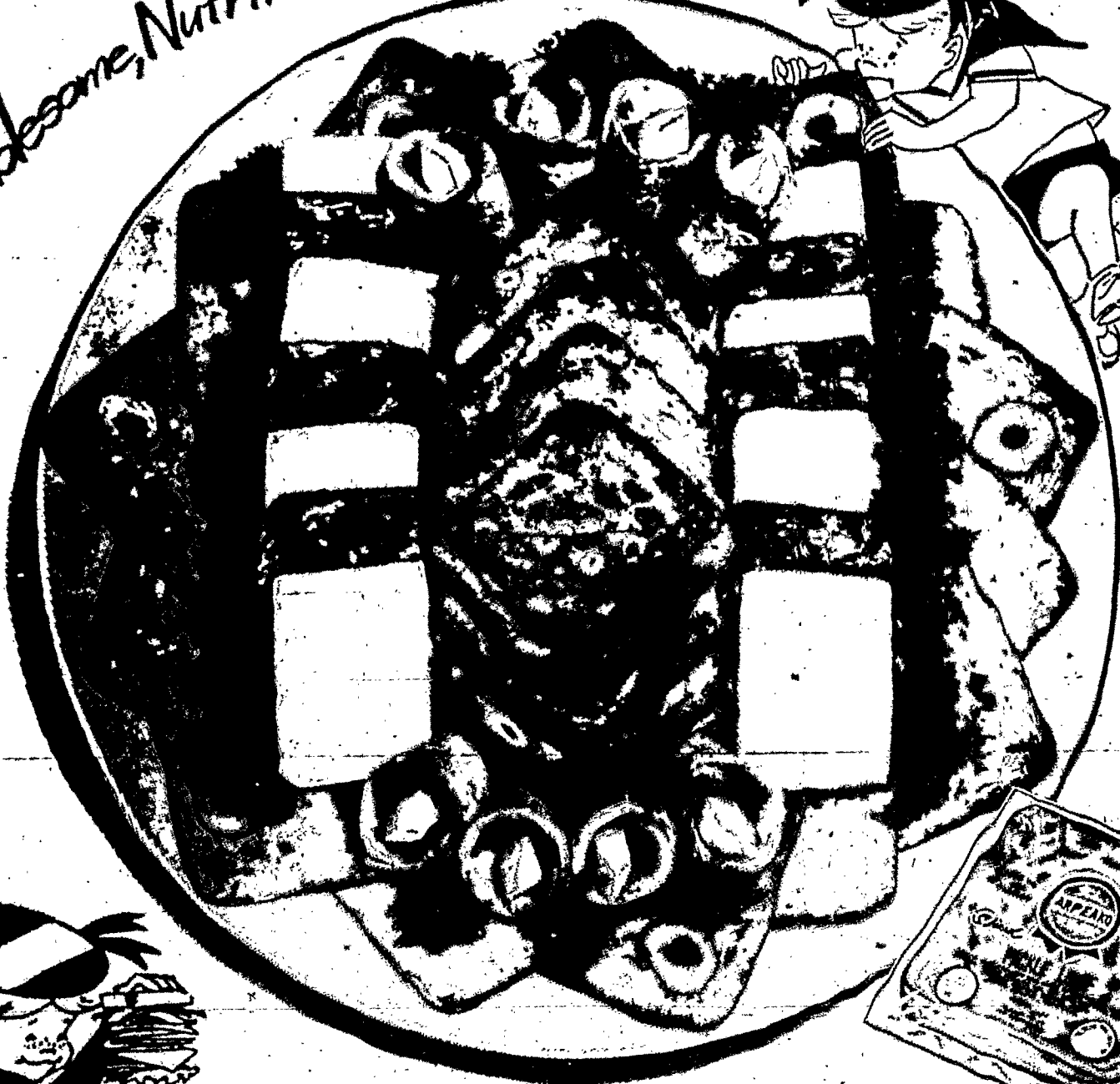


### Canadian Bishop At Aquinas

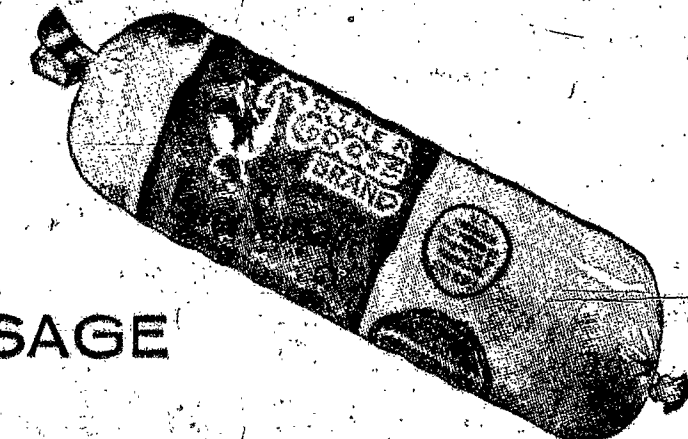
