Father Smith expressed thanks to the past officers for their work in behalf of the organization and to Mrs. George Hall of the Ave Maria Shop for the loan of the "beautiful Sacred Heart statue."

The moderator introduced the Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, pastor of St. Stephen's Church, who was luncheon speaker.

DISCUSSING the subject of "Happiness," Father Nolan emphasized that the happiest time of life is not the past or the future but the present. In the search for happiness, he said, we have the means of eternal happiness through the Sacraments of the church.

"There is no happiness like the happiness of a clear conscience," he said, "if we kneel at the feet of our Blessed Lord in the Sacrament of Penance."
