A comedy skit on the Ed Sullivan Show last week revolved about a man who said that he spent \$50,000 for a new home. He explained that the house was priced at only \$17,000... it was the "extras" that brought the final cost so high.

The new home also brought him a mother-in-law, you will remember, who couldn't appear on "Person-to-Person" because "she didn't have any friends."

At any rate, the remarks about the house cost in this satire were brought to mind when, in the Powers Building corridor yesterday, I heard the following remark:

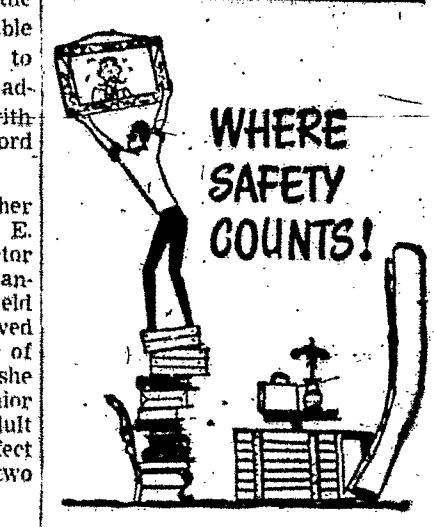

Mr. Gallagher was former Postmaster in Geneva and was prominently identified with the Democratic party in Geneva city and in Ontario County.

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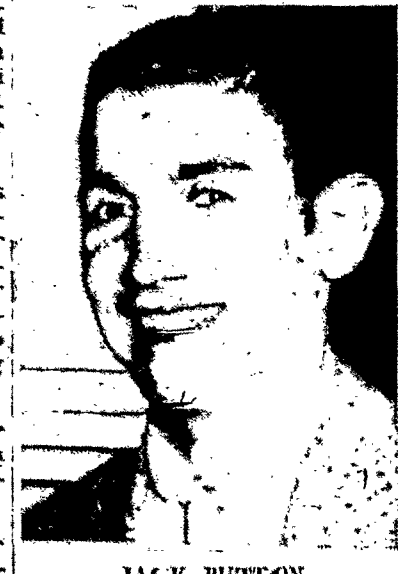
