Teenage Report On America

After a year's study in America, three teen-age diplomats are ready to go home.

What will they tell their friends and relatives about life in America when they get there?

EVA LANDGREBE, 16-year-old miss from Austria, will give a most gratifying picture of this country.

"I have found the people I met much friendlier than Europeans," Eva said. "There is more devotion to Catholicism in this country and people tend to do more for the church, especially in self-sacrifice and giving towards the support of the church."

Eva, studying as a junior at Nazareth Academy, has been the house guest of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene E. McCarthy at 55 Lakeside Pl. Although she will receive no school credit for her work here, Eva was thrilled at the prospect of coming to this country.

She likes the United States very much and would like to come back "to visit, but not to stay," she said.

"Schools are different in this country," she said. "The schools in Austria are operated by the state and they give you no choice of subjects. Also, in this country, there is much more social life connected with the schools. Courses are harder in Austria," Eva added.

LIKE EVA, Martha J. Boesch, 18, of Honduras, Central America, was sent to this country to study by the International High School Program of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

Living with Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Mighore at 163 Falstaff Rd. this year, Jennie, as she prefers being called, is a senior student at Our Lady of Mercy High School.

Prior to coming to the United States, she had already completed her high school course in Honduras.

What is America to you, we asked.

"America is like a dream come true," Jennie said. "Your customs are different as are the people, but I feel like I have been home, because everyone treats me as part of the family. I think you have the most beautiful country in the whole world."

As in Eva's case, Jennie would like to come back to visit, but she prefers Honduras as her permanent home. She also agrees that the social life is much fuller in this country.

"Both the United States and Honduras have about the same religious favor," she said. "Our country is about 88 percent Catholic."

JENNIE WAS under one definite handicap when she arrived in Rochester. She could speak little or no English. This year has seen her gain a firm grasp of our language and in spite of this handicap, got better than average grades in her courses.

Jennie said that she was very grateful to the National Catholic Welfare Conference for sending her here. "If more countries would participate in this type of program, I think that this would bring the people of the world closer together and result in the ending of all wars," she said.

JOHN RODARI, 17, a native of Milan, Italy, is in this country through the Association of Teenage Diplomats, Inc., a Rochester area organization which operates through the American Field Service organization in the exchange of students.
