

Professor Praises Legion Of Mary, Religion Schools

Father Leo Ward, C.S.C., a well-known author and professor of philosophy at the University of Notre Dame, was in this Diocese this week to observe the set-up of the Schools of Religion that were recently started here, to teach Catholicism to public school pupils.

Father Ward, who is also a widely known sociologist, also studied the Legion of Mary here and intends to incorporate his new-found knowledge in future books that he may write and also in his subject matter in his philosophy courses at Notre Dame.

Father Ward was the guest of Father Benedict Ehrmann in Watkins Glen, Monsignor William Naughton at St. Anne's, Brighton Park, Father Leo Mannus of St. Bernard's Seminary and Father Leonard Kelly, Fairport.

COMMENTING on his trip here, Father Ward said that he "was greatly impressed with this new method of teaching as practiced by Father Kelly and Father Ehrmann in the Schools of Religion."

"Because of the increase in the number of children in the past several years, pastors face the problem of not having enough room in parochial schools."

"The Schools of Religion are an excellent remedy in solving the problem of religious education of the children," Father Ward said.

In commenting on the Legion of Mary, Father Ward stated that "the Legion of Mary belongs everywhere. The members take the rules of St. Ignatius and use them in a practical way in their contacts."

FATHER WARD also said that "Catholic parishes across the country tend to get stronger when parish priests and leaders get more active in civic life. They become the forefront of civic development, which influences the morale of the community and brings good government to that community."

He further commented on education in Russia compared to that in the United States.

"Under the communist system, the Russians have made headway in the development of their scientists. In fact, they seem to be able to do this faster than we are. However," he stated, "whether this will be permanent, thing is questionable. I don't think they will be able to keep up this very rapid pace, for the

simple reason that scientists want to be free in doing their work. Under the communist government, this is not possible.

"I think that in a very short time we will surpass them because of the academic freedom we enjoy in this country."

Father Ward said that a book he has written on the Catholic education will appear in the Fall. It is to be published by Herter Publications in St. Louis.

HE STATES in the book that some Catholic schools substitute piety for intellectual effort. The idea of Catholic action as Catholic learning has not been conceived in this country. The parochial schools must realize that as a person lives in society, he learns. Our pupils need a vision of greatness and the only way

they can get it is from their teachers, who must sharpen their own intellects.

Father Ward spends part of his vacation each year in making these survey trips so that he can keep up with the latest progress in social development, which he incorporates in his teaching at the university.

He has written several books on his travels including "Ourself, Inc.," about a mid-western cooperative community, and "God In An Irish Kitchen," based on the people he met while traveling in Ireland.

Father Ward intends to use the information he received on his visit to this diocese in a pastoral theology course he will be teaching this summer at Notre Dame to young priests.

Father Schwab New Chemung-Schuyler Dean

The appointment of Father Leo G. Schwab as dean of the Chemung-Schuyler Deanery is the high point of this priest who just recently celebrated his 40th anniversary of ordination.

With the exception of six months as assistant pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, Rochester, and six years as assistant at St. Thomas Church, Leicester, Father Schwab has spent his entire priestly career in Elmira.

In the time he has spent in Elmira, first as assistant priest at St. Patrick's Church from Dec. 12, 1918 to July 3, 1931 and since July 1, 1940 as founder-pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Father Schwab has distinguished himself in both his priestly duties and as an unselfish civic leader.

Among his accomplishments were the construction of a gothic styled church, seating 600 people, and more recently, an eight-classroom, one story school. He also constructed a convent for the Sisters of Mercy who staff the school (see appointment story on page one.)

DR. JOHN S. McROBERTS, Pediatrician and a member of the School of Nursing Faculty was guest speaker. Doctor McRoberts said: "There are hundreds of elements which may make or mar your lives—which may contribute to your success, or help you in the days of failure. I shall consider very briefly just two of these. The first is Imperturbability, and in the nurse no quality ranks with it... in full development, as we see it in some of our Sisters and Nurses, it has the nature of a Divine Gift, a blessing to the profession, a comfort to all who come in contact with her. In true and perfect form, Imperturbability is bound up necessarily with wide experience, knowledge and calm nerves."

Doctor continued: "Next there is the mental equivalent to this bodily endowment—that of Equanimity. Natural temperament has much to do with its development, but a clear knowledge of our relations to our fellow creatures and to the work of life is also indispensable. The essentials then—Natural Temperament, An Understanding of Human Nature and A Philosophy of Love."

"Strive for that equanimity which will help you put all things in the arts, in human relations and in relations with God," Dr. Roberts concluded.
