More than 125 volunteer workers are expected to turn out for the kick-off dinner of the St. Patrick's Parish building fund campaign on Thursday at 6 p.m. at the Victor Elementary School. His Excellency Bishop Casey is the principal speaker.

AN OVERFLOW number of committee members and other parishioners are expected to gather at Victor Town Hall last night (Thursday) to hear Rev. Leonard Kelly, pastor of Our Lady of the Assumption Parish, discuss expansion of a religious training center in his own parish similar to that planned for the Victor parish.

Father Kelly lauded the Victor pastor, Rev. E. Joseph Esser, and his parishioners in taking this major step in parish development as "a significant contribution to the religious, cultural and civic life of the entire community."

The advanced gifts committee under the chairmanship of Laurence Kavel, assisted by Flor Malone, Victor J. Tischer and Owen J. Keenan, general chairman, are working to raise a limited collection this week, 1960 to the parishwide dedication of three year pledges from parishioners, scheduled for Sunday, June 29, between the hours of 1:30 and 5:30 p.m.

THE CAMPAIGN committee is seeking a minimum goal of \$50,000 to finance construction of a new building to serve as a catechetical center and parish hall.

Unique in design the new structure features prefabricated all steel construction, with recessed, folding partitions between its three classrooms to convert the entire area into a large meeting room for parish social functions. While widely utilized in church and school construction in other sections of the country, the Victor project is the initial application of the design in this region and is attracting wide-spread interest.
