

Nazareth College Summer Session Begins Today

The summer session at Nazareth College, will begin today, Friday, at the East Ave. campus, for a period of six weeks.

Courses are listed in the elementary teacher division, library science and on the undergraduate and graduate level.

A SPECIAL course in education, "Personality Development of Children," is being offered. It brings into focus modern psychological research and techniques related to personality factors in normal and disturbed children and is specially designed for teachers and administrators who work with children and young adolescents.

THE INSTRUCTOR for the course is a Sister of St. Joseph who has earned graduate degrees in both education and social work. She has had classroom experience in the elementary school as well as clinical experience in the social psychiatric field.

Another special course being offered is one on Dante. This course will be taught by Sister Margaret Theresa, Ph. D., a Dante scholar.

COURSES in the graduate division will be taught by Dr. Gerald A. Smith, Dr. William B. Gwin, Dr. James A. White, Dr. David Fetter and Dr. Jess P. Casey.

The regular instructional facilities of the college, including the services of many of the regular teaching staff, are available for the summer session.
