WE ARE FAMILIAR WITH the word Catechism, but not so familiar with the word Catechist. A catechist is one who teaches religion in an area, to a group, preparing them for reception into the Church by a priest. Catechists do not work in any great extent in the United States though the need is imperative. On the average each priest in the United States has only three converts a year. If the lally were trained in their faith and zealous enough the number of converts per year in the United States would increase ten-fold.

THE MISSIONS CANNOT EXIST without catechists, because priests are so few for the harvest. Here is an example of how one small seed has grown into the mustard tree. Fifty years ago, two White Father missionaries on a brief visit trained and then left one catechist for the Alur country of Africa which at the time was wholly pagan. Today, in that area there are 80,000 Catholics. In one village last year there were 2,000 adult baptisms which equals the number of converts in some of our large cities.

HERE LIES AN OPPORTUNITY for the faithful to live up to the obligations of the Sacrament of Confirmation. Baptism incorporates us to Christ the King Who founded the Kingdom of His Church; Holy Orders incorporates us to Christ the Priest Who sacrifices Himself for the sins of the world; Confirmation incorporates us to Christ the Teacher Who came into the world to "give testimony of the Truth."

CATHOLICS WHO REALIZE that Confirmation imprints an indelible character on their soul know that they are bound to spread the faith and make converts. In other words, to be Catechists. If you have failed to fulfill the duties of Confirmation at home then hire a catechist to do so for you in the Missions. One can be hired for as little as \$20. a month. When you send your sacrifice to the Holy Father through his Society for the Propagation of the Faith he distributes it to the area of the world most in need. Thank you again and again for helping him spread the Faith.

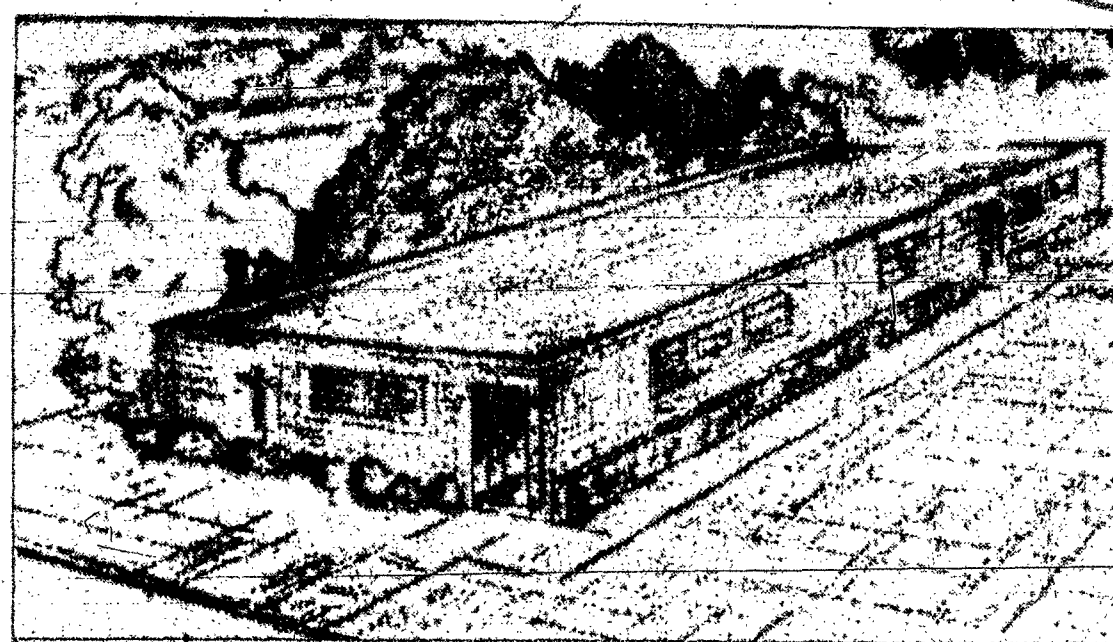
Two Students Named On CSMC Program

Holy Family League Makes Pilgrimage

A group of 41 pilgrims from Holy Family parish, Rochester, made a two-day pilgrimage to Martyrs' Shrine, Midland, Ontario, last weekend. Members of the People's Eucharistic League, they made the trip by bus under the leadership of Joseph Snyder and Ruth Friday. Rev. Thomas Crookman is spiritual director of the group.

The principal purpose of the league is adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. The Holy Family unit adds to this primary activity support of an adopted missionary, a priest from their own parish.

The Canadian pilgrimage combined the group's eucharistic and missionary aims with visits to sites of great Catholic historical interest to Americans and Canadians alike.

THE SHRINE church tops a hill overlooking the recently excavated remains of the 17th Century Jesuit mission residence Ste-Marie-Among-the-Hurons. On this spot lived Father Simon LeMoine and others of the Jesuits who first brought the faith to New York State. Six of the eight Jesuit Martyrs of North America lived here. Two of them were buried at Ste-Marie and the grave of St. John de Brebeuf was in the sacred spots visited by the Rochester pilgrimage.

The group left Rochester on June 21 and arrived that afternoon. After a night at the shrine hostel, Sunday morning's program included Mass in the shrine church, the Way of the Cross outdoors on Martyrs' Hill, and a guided visit to the 300-year-old residence of Ste-Marie.

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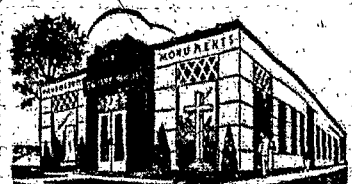
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
