## Dioceses Produce Live Shows

Chicago—(NC)—Forty-four of 79 dioceses responding to a poll engage in producing live television programs.

On the Rochester Diocese, Midnight Mass is telecast each Christmas from the Nazareth Motherhouse and each Easter, Mass is telecast from the Our Lady of Mercy Motherhouse Chapel by WROC-TV.

THIS WAS shown in a study conducted by Father Hugh M. Beahan, Grand Rapids, Mich., diocesan director of radio and TV. Its results were presented to the 10th anniversary convention of the Catholic Broadcasters Association here. Father Beahan is vice president of the association.

The 44 dioceses are producing 108 programs, Father Beahan said. Among these, 62.5 per cent are on a weekly basis; 13.5 per cent are presented more than once a week and 14 per cent less than once a week.

HALF-HOUR programs constitute 52 per cent of the total reported, Father Beahan said. Sunday is the most popular day of broadcast, with 43 per cent of the programs originating on that day. Friday is second with 13 per cent broadcast then, he said.

Father Beahan said that local Catholic telecasts have increased 220 per cent in the past five years and 45 per cent in the past 12 months alone.

The majority of the telecasting, he continued, is done as a public service by the TV stations. About 67 per cent of the programs are on the air on this basis. About 28 per cent pay for their broadcast time and about 4 per cent are sponsored—usually special programs such as Christmas Midnight Mass, Father Beahan said.

### Papal Audience On Color Film

Vatican City—(NC)—For the first time an entire papal audience has been recorded by a motion picture camera in color.

The film documentary was made by a team of 21 photographers, including cameramen from Italy, Germany, Austria, England and Czechoslovakia. Two hundred photo reflectors were used, having a total power of about 1,800,000 watts, to provide sufficient lighting in the interior of St. Peter's basilica.

The movie, produced for a German company, opens with the exit of His Holiness Pope Pius XII from an elevator in the rear of the basilica after he has descended from his apartments. It then follows the progress of the audience in its entirety from many angles and concludes as the Pope gives his blessing and is borne out on the portable throne.

## More Vocations Coming Ex-Movie Star Says

Mexico City—(RNS)—A one-time Mexican movie and operatic star who became a Franciscan priest 10 years ago believes that a new age is coming which will witness entering the religious life.

He is Father Jose Maria de Guadalupe, who won fame in the film and opera world as Jose Mojito, and is now secretary of the Work for Vocations of the Order of Friars Minor in the Americas.

GRAY-HAIRED and slightly hard of hearing, but still youthful in appearance, Father Jose said here that people everywhere are experiencing disillusionment and disappointment, but this merely foreshadows "the great age of vocations to come."

There are fewer vocations at present, Father Jose said, because of "the impact of the material world and all that it seems to offer." Young people, he explained, are faced on all sides with the glamor of material possessions, and many try to share in "a luxurious and sensually satisfying life."

"But if you will remember," he continued, "humanity has always gone through ages of questioning and we are in one today. Many of the great saints found their vocation through disillusionment. We are now about to see the same kind of resurgence of many saints—people who will find their vocation in maturity, having known the world and found that it can well be left behind."

FATHER JOSE said the great numbers of people in mental hospitals, under psychiatric care, suffering from so-called psychosomatic diseases, sunk in apathy or slaves to drugs or alcohol is proof that material things do not bring real happiness.

## Teachers Taking Course Over TV Closed Circuit

Notre Dame, Ind.—(NC)—Approximately 250 high school teachers enrolled in the University of Notre Dame Summer session are hearing a series of lectures in mathematics by way of closed circuit television.

The two-week lecture series represents Notre Dame's first experiment with TV as a medium for academic instruction.

Dr. Arnold Ross, head of the Notre Dame mathematics department, will lecture on "Boolean Algebra" from the studios of WNDU-TV, the university's television station. His students, many of them nuns, will be taking notes in several TV-equipped classrooms on the campus.

The lectures will be followed by several round-table discussions, off-camera, in which the high school teachers will evaluate TV as a medium for instruction, particularly in mathematics.

The teachers should be particularly valuable on the viewing end, Ross explained. "They are not only interested in mathematics; they also have a professional interest in teaching and teaching methods," he said.

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"On the other hand," he said, "material things can be terribly disappointing. Out of this disappointment and disillusion come questioning and seeking. The time is not far off when an upsurge of faith and vocations will usher in a new age of saints."

Father Jose said God has left him his voice and "use it in my work of finding and fostering vocations."
