Cardinal To Lead Lourdes Pilgrimage

New York—(RNS)—Cardinal Spellman will lead a pilgrimage of about 200 persons from 28 states, District of Columbia, Hawaii and Canada, to the world famous shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes, France, on Sept. 8.

The pilgrimage is the largest from this country in connection with the 100th anniversary of the Marian apparitions witnessed by St. Bernadette at the grotto of Massabielle at Lourdes in 1858. A highlight of the Lourdes visit will be the celebration of a Mass by Cardinal Spellman at the grotto where the Virgin Mary appeared 18 times to the 14-year-old French peasant girl.

Before returning here on Oct. 13, the pilgrims also will visit Fatima, Portugal, Rome, Naples, Athens, Lisbon, Gibraltar and other principal European cities.

While in Rome, the group hopes to be received in audience by Pope Pius XII.

Graphic Description of Faith

Priest's Booklet Published

Father F. Charles Bauer, assistant pastor of St. Francis of Assisi Church, Rochester, has announced the publication of a catechetical instruction booklet, "A Graphic Description of Christian Doctrine," by The Queen's Work of St. Louis, Mo.

Father Bauer said that the booklet, which is based on the Baltimore Catechism, "is intended as a graphic representation of the fundamental truths of the Catholic Religion."

BASED ON manuscripts that he has used for the instruction of converts over the past eight years, the booklet simplifies the teaching of doctrines as expressed in the Baltimore catechism.

"This booklet can also be used for instruction by the nuns in their religion classes and for release-time instruction," Father Bauer said. "In release-time instruction it will be especially valuable," he related.

"Where in the Baltimore or other catechisms that are in use today, the pupils are generally taught by rote, in my booklet, the students get a graphic description that will enable them to grasp the truths of Catholicism much more easily," he said.

"I compiled this booklet after several of my priest-friends advised me to do so," Father Bauer related. "Actually, I have found it very helpful in my convert work during the past eight years, and I hope it helps others in this work as it has helped me."

TO SHOW the effect of this new booklet, Father Bauer said that he had started one of his present potential converts on the Baltimore catechism. Mid-way through the instruction, he switched to the new booklet.

"The effect on my student was remarkable," Father Bauer re-

lated. "He told me that this booklet made all these teachings so much clearer and so much easier to understand."

The booklet purposely has no text.

It gives each teacher the opportunity to express in his own way the teachings of Catholicism and with spaces for notes, it gives the student the opportunity to write down these teachings in

the best way he can remember them.

"The booklet is also meant to give every Catholic a review and refresher course on his beliefs, and enable him to recall the truths that have been taught him in the past," Father Bauer added.

Published at a cost of 50 cents, the booklet is available at Trant's. It contains the imprimatur of His Excellency Bishop Kearney.

Soviet Zone Network Promotes Atheism

Berlin—(RNS)—Radio DDR, largest of the three Soviet Zone radio networks, has inaugurated a regular Sunday morning program devoted to combatting "religious ideas and superstition."

It is on the air immediately following a Protestant Sunday service and a newscast on religious developments.

Beamed over all waves of the network, the new program is called "Universe, Earth and Men." The title is the same as that of a standard East German atheistic book which is distributed to participants in Communist youth dedication ceremonies.

The two other networks, the Berliner Rundfunk and the Deutschlandsender, have long since discontinued the practice of including Christian services in their programs.

St. Casimir's Rosarians Hear Talk On Shroud

Rev. Edward A. Shamon, assistant pastor of Our Lady of the Lake Church, Watkins Glen was heard in a slide-lecture on the Holy Shroud of Turin at the June meeting of the Rosary Society of St. Casimir's Church, June 16.

The meeting as attended by about 100 persons in the school hall.

Father Shamon pointed out that the evidence presented by this sacred relic of Christendom proves incontrovertibly that this Shroud preserved in the Cathedral of Turin, Italy, and guarded for centuries by the Royal House of Savoy, is the authentic wrapping sheet which held the body of Christ in the tomb.

THE LECTURER said that the impression on this cloth has been thoroughly investigated by the world of science and authenticity of the Shroud was defended on the floor of the French Academy of Science by an illustrious scientist of the famed Sorbonne Institute in Paris, Dr. Yves Delage, a professional agnostic.

London—(NC)—Queen Elizabeth included two Catholic Bishops in the annual distribution of honors on her official birthday.

Bishop James Buis, Vicar Apostolic of Jesselton, North Borneo, was made an honorary Commander of the Order of the British Empire (C.B.E.) for his public services. The Dutch-born prelate is a member of St. Joseph's Society for Foreign Missions, known as the Mill Hill Fathers after their headquarters in the London area.

Little Rock—(NC)—One of the fastest-growing parishes in Little Rock has struck head-on against the stone wall of vocation shortage.

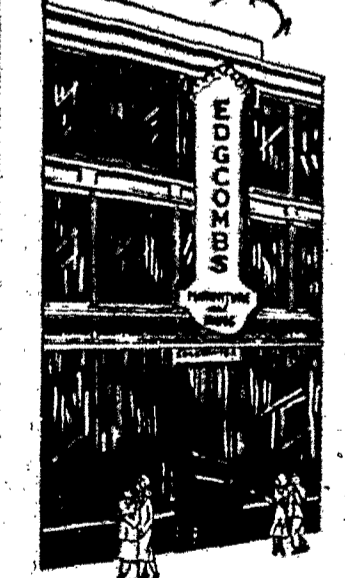
