Hibernians Name State, Local Officers

New York State's Ancient Order of Hibernians elected Joseph M. Giblin of New York City president at the concluding session of the 69th biennial convention in Rochester. Walter Anderson of Rochester was named a director.

The Hibernians and their Auxiliary will hold their next state convention in Elmira in 1960.

The AOH and Ladies numbering 865 members heard two Bishops in sessions in Rochester.

His Excellency, Bishop Kearney at the opening Mass in St. Mary's Church, June 26, called upon the society to "enthrone the Virgin Mary in our hearts, just as the country has enthroned her in thousands of churches and homes."

THE BISHOP urged each member to "imitate the virtues of Our Blessed Lady," have personal purity, a deep sense of the importance of modesty, and have holy concern for the sanctity of marriage bonds.

His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey spoke at the banquet, Saturday night, in Hotel Sierston. He said the Irish had endured seven centuries of bloody persecution, and emerged a free and happy people because "they never lost the vision of eternal truth."

"We Americans of Irish extraction," Bishop Casey said, "can well ask ourselves whether we have kept faith with the beliefs."

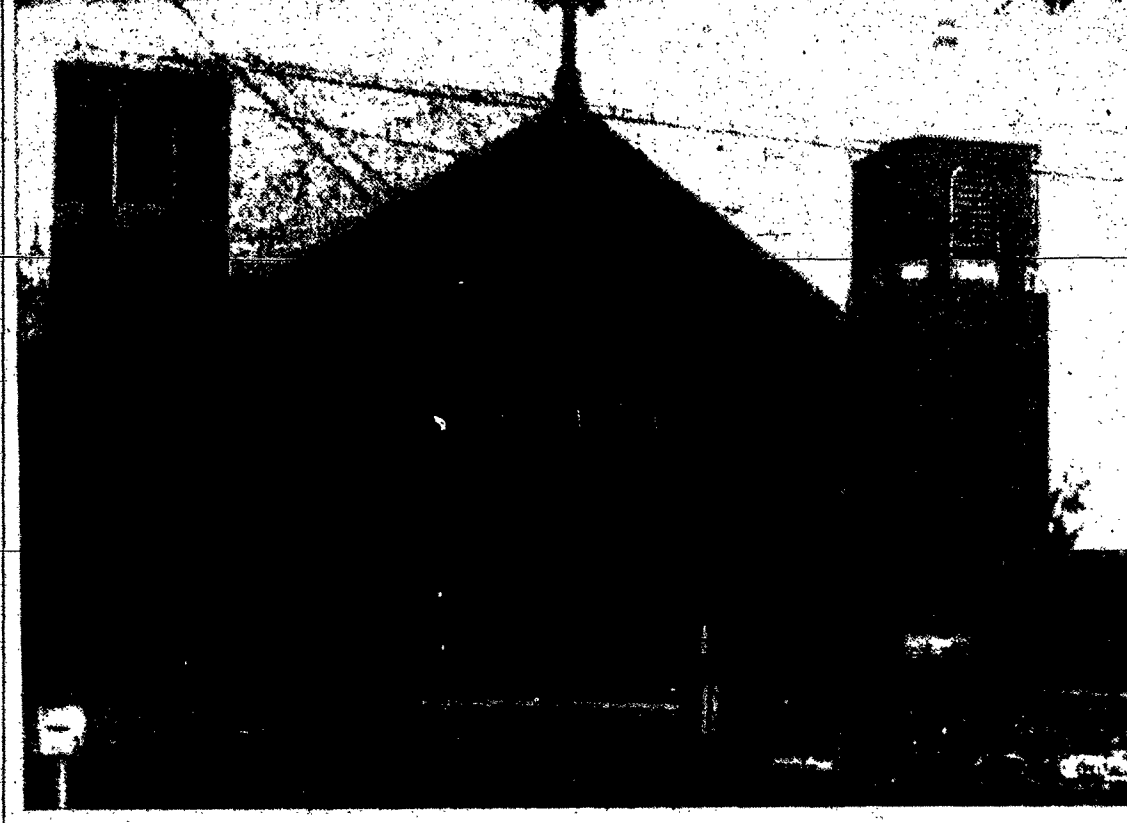

Construction Of St. Nicholas Church Nears Completion

Final stages of construction are at hand for the new St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic Church in Elmira Heights, according to the Very Rev. Vladimir B. Dowhovitch, pastor.

The new \$250,000 edifice of Modern Byzantine architecture will have a seating capacity of 288 to take care of the 170 families of the parish.

Dedication is expected to take place around Labor Day when the Most Rev. Ambrose Senyshyn, O.S.B.M., Bishop (Exarch) of the Ukrainian, Conn., Diocese will be in Elmira Heights for the formal ceremony.

A SPECIAL feature of the church is a "crying room" where mothers and young children may assist at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass or other services and hear yet not be heard.

An annex connected to the church of L shaped construction may be used for social events, parish dinners or may be converted into six classrooms for school and religious instructions. The latter can be effected by the use of accordion doors.

A completely equipped kitchen ample for all parish needs adjoins the annex as does the boiler room. All rooms and the church are on the same level.

The latest in electronic carillons will be installed and will include a chime and hour strike unit, Angelus and tolling units and is officially known as the Cathedral Five Bell System. An amplifier for broadcast of music or services from the church is also included.

The present church property on Horseheads Blvd., dates back over 60 years. Father Dowhovitch has been pastor for the past 22 years. Father Waldimir Maslo is present assistant.

THREE MASSES are offered each Sunday, two Masses each day of the week and evening Masses are celebrated on Holydays and each First Friday.

Devotions are held each evening during May, the month of Our Blessed Mother, in June the month of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and in October the month dedicated to the Rosary.

Father Dowhovitch teaches religion each week to 65 children and is active in getting around to visit the members of his widely scattered parish. He remains remarkably vigorous when it is taken into account that last year he observed his golden jubilee in the holy priesthood.

Honorable Ancestors Spinning

Kyoto, Japan—(NC)—Father Michael Tokugawa, descendant of the infamous shogun warlords who murdered thousands of Christians, was ordained in St. Francis Xavier Cathedral here last week.

Father Tokugawa's father, Baron Tokugawa, was the first Japanese to pilot an airplane and was a general in World War II. The family became poor after the war.

Father Tokugawa became a Catholic while living at Villa Maude, a hostel for poor students at Kyoto University. It is operated by Maryknoll Father John C. Murrell, of Buffalo, N.Y.

Pioneer Monk Dies in Oregon

St. Benedict—(NC)—The last surviving member of the group of seven that founded 75-year-old Mt. Angel Abbey here has died at the age of 92. He was Benedictine Father Maurus Snyder.

Father Maurus, who came to Oregon in 1852 as a novice-candidate, was the senior member in years of religious vows and priesthood in the Swiss-American Congregation of Benedictines in the U.S.

Born in Oberkirch, Switzerland in 1856, he joined the Benedictines of the Abbey of Engelberg at the age of 17 and became one of the group of seven which sailed for the United States to establish, eventually, the abbey of Mount Angel, located 40 miles south of Portland.
