## Father Nolan Pays Tribute To Organist

Geneva — Special tribute was paid by the pastor, Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, of St. Stephen's Church, in the weekly church bulletin, to the memory of James F. Lynch, who was church organist for 40 years.

Father Nolan stated that Lynch's period of services dates back to the time of Rev. Stephen McPadden, first pastor of the parish, who encouraged him to study the organ.

"Mr. Lynch's musical talents on the piano and organ were outstanding," Father Nolan said. "His fidelity to the daily Masses and his reverence in the rendition of the music and singing of the High Mass were among his outstanding characteristics. He will be missed for a long time because of his close association with the services of St. Stephen's Church."

MR. LYNCH'S funeral was held in St. Stephen's Church. He died Friday, June 13, 1958 in Clifton Springs Sanitarium.

Father Nolan was celebrant of the solemn requiem funeral Mass, assisted by Rev. John F. Duffy, deacon, and Rev. Raymond G. Ringwood, sub-deacon.

Present in the sanctuary were Monsignors Edward K. Ball V.F., John P. McCarthy, and the Reverend Fathers Eugene McFarland, Joseph L. Hogan, C. Richard Nangle, John J. Leary, William E. Davis, Francis Harding and John A. Morgan.

The funeral Mass was sung by the men's choir under the direc-

tion of Henry Sedorovich. Interment was in St. Mary's Cemetery with Father Nolan officiating at the grave, assisted by Monsignor Ball, Father Duffy, Father Ringwood and Father Hogan.

Bearers were Charles E. Durkee, John F. Hickey, Henry E. Sabine, Arthur E. Dwyer, Richard K. O'Brien and Philip T. Spillane.

Lynch whose life-long career was in the field of music was organist at St. Stephen's Church for 40 years and also served as choir director. At one time, for a number of years, he played with Paul Whiteman's Collegians and traveled abroad with the orchestra. He has played a piano for many years at Belhurst Club.

HE WAS BORN in Geneva and was graduated from St. Francis de Sales High School. He attended Cornell University and was a

member of the Savage Club at Cornell and Phi Kappa Sigma fraternity.

He was a member of the Geneva Rod and Gun Club, the Geneva Lodge of Elks and a member of the Geneva Musicians Union.

He is survived by his widow, Margaret Stapleton Lynch; three daughters, Mrs. Alfred R. Finerty, Dansville, Mrs. Francis J. McCormick, Geneva, and Sister M. James, the former Elizabeth J. Lynch, of the Order of the Sisters of St. Joseph; one brother, John B. Lynch, this city, two grandchildren and several nieces.

Featured by the Women's Choral Club directed by Marie Keber Burbank was "Our Lady of Lourdes Hymn" with words by Bishop Kearney. Mrs. Helen Kendrick was accompanist. Jack and Lucille Kelly, New York musical artists were acclaimed in their Broadway musical show numbers.

The convention banquet drew 820 knights and ladies to Hotel Manger ballroom. Bishop Kearney presented each guest with a souvenir card bearing the Lourdes prayer and his hymn.

In the main address the Bishop cited Franz Werfel, author of "The Song of Bernadette" as an instrument of God in making widely known the Apparitions of Our Lady of Lourdes.

BISHOP KEARNEY recalled how Werfel, a non-Catholic made a promise that if saved from dictatorship oppression he would sing the song of Bernadette. He fulfilled that promise, the Bishop said.

The story of Bernadette is an "Unfinished Symphony," according to Bishop Kearney. The first part comprises Our Lord, the Redeemer of mankind and Our Lady at the right hand of the

Redeemer, to intercede for us. The second part will come in our union with them in Heaven.

Marking, the Bishop said, became more aware of the apparitions of Lourdes through the instrument of Werfel's book and later motion picture than in any other way.

A song of welcome composed by Sister Joseph Mary, S.S.N.D., a member of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Auxiliary who teaches music at the High School of the Institute of Notre Dame in Baltimore, Md. was sung at the banquet. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Zimmer, 7 Carl St., also members.

With Col. and Mrs. Eckert leading the grand march, the military ball was held in the War Memorial Sunday night with Len Hawley's orchestra supplying the music. The Memorial decoration was featured by shields representing each commandery and auxiliary.

Brig. Gen. Earl E. Boyle of Syracuse, former state president of the knights speaking to the auxiliary charged the women with the responsibility of controlling the love, affection and tolerance in their homes as well as in their organizations.
