AMONG WOMEN Silver Anniversary

Within the next two weeks Camp Columbus on Owasco Lake will observe the silver anniversary of its founding. The camp has become widely known for its general excellence, but there are a few people who do not know the history of its founding.

"Come with me," said Mr. Harrington, and both jumped into a Ford pickup and proceeded south on Owasco Road.

"It was a very hot, clear summer day. The journey was short, just seven miles from the center of Auburn. The land was unutilized, but clear.

"The priest, with the check still in his possession, looked at it and showing it to the owner of the lots, said, 'Sir, this is what I have, and this is what I will give you.'

"In three minutes the deal was closed and this was the beginning of permanent Camp Columbus, July 13, 1933. Of course, everyone knows that Mr. Harrington's priest-friend was no other than the Rev. Frederick G. Straub, pastor of St. Alphonsus Church in Auburn.

"There the young priest sought advice on how to invest so much money. He thought of buying Eastman Kodak stock which at that time was very low—about thirty dollars a share. He waited in the lobby for some advice for nearly two hours.

"Just about closing time, he was accosted by an Auburn business man, J. Joseph Harrington, who in his jovial way, suggested that the money be invested in real estate on the east side of Owasco Lake.

Danny Thomas Donates Statuary

St. Ignace, Ill. — (RNS) — Television Star Danny Thomas attended dedicatory ceremonies for a statuary group of the crucifixion scene at the new cemetery on the grounds of St. Jude Seminary here.

Thomas donated the statuary, which includes a cross and three statues of white Italian marble.

The TV star is an ardent devotee of St. Jude and promised to honor the saint if the model in the show business. He also has been instrumental in obtaining funds for St. Jude Hospital in Tennessee.

THE COURT'S action climaxed a year-long legal battle which started shortly after Pope XII had complained that "vulgarily pornographic posters" were being displayed in disregard of the sacred character of Rome as the center of Catholicism.

Pope Pius voiced his criticism at an audience in 1957 to Rome's Lenten preachers. He said indecent movie poster displays were a violation of the Italy-Vatican concordat which pledges the government to ban anything that may be contrary to "the sacred character of the Eternal City."

Less than a week after the Pope's protest, Rome authorities seized some 2,000 film posters. Among them were some advertising a French film, "En Effeillant La Marguerite" (Plucking the Daisy), starring Brigitte Bardot, which had its world premiere in Rome.
