

Knight From Africa Meets Friends At SVD Seminary

Conesus—Friends he had met in the Society of the Divine Word missions in Ghana, West Africa, greeted Patrick Hulede, the Knights of St. John convention delegate at St. Michael's Divine Word Seminary in Conesus, this week.

Hulede talked with Father Edward Datig, S.V.D. who was Regional Superior of the Divine Word missions in Ghana. From Pittsburgh, Father Datig had been in Ghana since 1946.

Also greeting the knight who traveled from Kumasi in Ghana to Rochester, a distance of 12,000 miles for the convention sessions, was Brother Cletus Lesage, S.V.D., now stationed in Conesus but who had served in Ghana since 1938.

Brother Cletus is a member of a family "that is trying to convert the world as a private enterprise," it was stated here. He has three more brothers in the Society of the Divine Word: Father Maurice, a missionary in the Philippines since 1939 and Father Emil, now spiritual director of the Society's Major Seminary at Techry, Ill.

DUE TO BECOME the first African S.V.D., Brother Novice James Djadoo who is just finishing his Novitiate at Conesus was on hand to greet the visitor. Brother James came to the United States two years ago.

Hulede has known the Divine Word Missionaries in Ghana for many years. At present he is teaching at the College of Technology in Kumasi, Ghana. He has studied in London and is on his way to attend the Pax Romana Convention in Rome.

In his address to the community here, Hulede re-echoed the Holy Father's plea of the Encyclical Fidei Donum for urgent and immediate aid and assistance for Africa. He expressed his gratitude, on behalf of his countrymen, for what the Divine Word Missionaries have done for his native land and for the church there.

Fr. Moynihan To Offer Mass In Home Parish

The Rev. James M. Moynihan, home after four years of study in Rome, will celebrate a Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving, Sunday, July 13 in Blessed Sacrament Church at 11 a.m.

Father Moynihan, son of Police Captain and Mrs. Michael J. Moynihan, 2109 Highland Ave. was ordained in the chapel of the North American College in Rome on Dec. 15, 1957.

HE WILL be assisted at the Mass by Monsignor Wilfred Craugh, P.A., rector of St. Bernard Seminary; the Rev. Lawrence Murphy, deacon; and the Rev. Thomas Statt, subdeacon. Sermon will be preached by the Rev. John Canaugh.

Father Moynihan is a graduate of Nazareth Hall Academy, St. Andrew Seminary and completed two years at St. Bernard Seminary before going to Rome.

He was assigned by His Excellency Bishop Kearney to be assistant pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church, Geneva.

'Little White Church' Busy No Longer

A little white frame church, St. Mary's, (Honeye) was dark and desolate this past Sunday morning. There was no priest at the altar; there was no congregation in the pews.

The "little white church in the valley," once bustling with activity, will be busy no more. But hundreds of the area residents sat in awe in another building a short distance away. St. Mary's parishioners in Honeye have a new church.

LONG overcrowded and lacking in parking space, old St. Mary's Church served the faithful in Honeye area for the last 80 years. And 10 years prior to that, Mass was celebrated over a store in the village.

But the seating capacity of 225 soon grew too small for the growing population. With the Summer vacationers at Honeye Lake the facilities were strained even more.

Finally, in late April of this year, construction was started on a new and much larger church for Honeye. Under the guidance of the Rev. J. Joseph O'Connell, pastor of St. Michael Church in Livonia Center who serves the Honeye mission church, work progressed rapidly.

In just nine weeks, the new church was completed. "The work was so rapid," said Father O'Connell, "that we found the church was completed before we were able to obtain pews." Folding chairs are temporarily serving the purpose.

LAST SUNDAY a total of more than 1,500 faithful attended the four Masses at the new church.

The first Mass was offered in the new edifice on Sunday, June 29. Only the day before, hundreds of the same people packed the old church for the final Mass there.

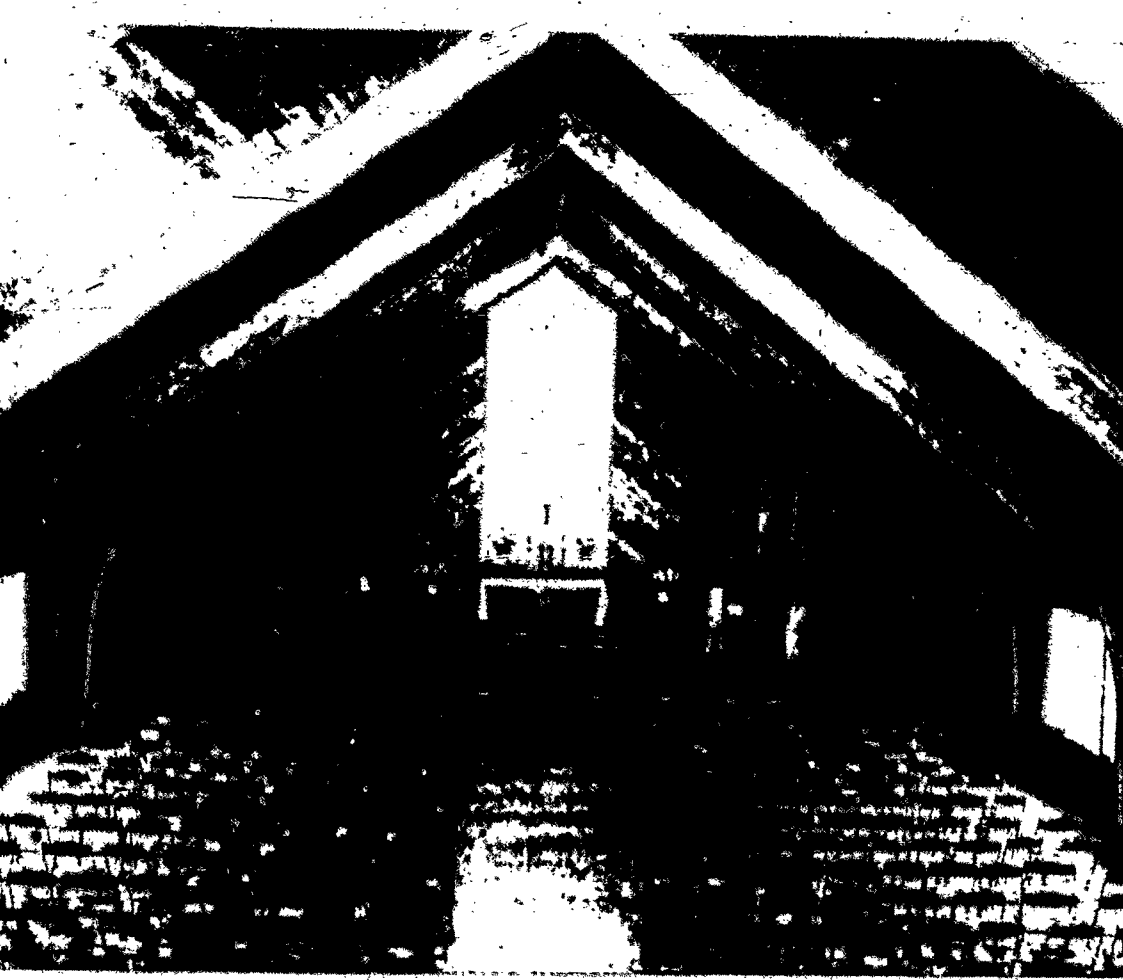
For many, this was the only church they had ever known. Tears filled the eyes of the overflow congregation as Father O'Connell celebrated High Mass. And following the Mass, many stared in sorrow as he locked the door of "the little white church in the valley" for the last time.

"Our new church is quite a contrast from the early beginnings of the parish," Father O'Connell said, "when parishioners had to travel several miles in a horse and buggy over muddy roads. And the only heat in the church was a little pot-bellied stove."

THE NEW church is rustic in design, finished both inside and outside in natural wood. Roof beams are four inches thick. The church will seat 450 people.

Laminated arches of Douglas fir form a striking appearance on the inside. Western red cedar is used extensively on the inside and outside with mahogany wall paneling. Brown and Hoyt Construction Co. of Canandaigua were the builders.

The parish of 80 families and

about 400 normally attending services, swells considerably during the Summer months as was evidenced by the 1,500 at last Sunday's services.

Father O'Connell, who serves both St. Michael's and St. Mary's, is aided in celebrating the extra Masses by the nearby Divine Word Fathers at St. Michael's Mission House.

What will happen to the old church? So far there are no definite plans.

Dedication ceremonies are now being planned for early September, according to Father O'Connell.
