Buffalo Club Wins Elmira K of C Meet

Bennett Athletic Club of Buffalo won the third annual track and field meet of the Elmira Knights of Columbus held recently at Parker Field, Elmira, by capturing two events.

The meet was witnessed by some 300 rain-drenched fans who saw the Buffalo club nose out the host Elmira Knights by a score of 35 to 31. The Erie County club gathered four second place finishes in track events and took surprise wins in the 220-yard and 440-yard dashes. They shaded Elmira in the broad and high jump events which concluded the program. Elmira gained a lone second place in the final two events.

New York Pioneer Club, paced by the stellar sweep of two firsts, a heat victory and a share in another win by Harry Bright, was third with 25 points.

Chicago Track and Field Club, led by Ira Murchison, tallied 23 points, with Triple Cities Track Club getting 4, Fulton AC 3 and eight other points being distributed among unplaced.

Murchison, a runner from scratch, was nipped by five yards in the 220-yard dash by Bob Harding of Bennett AC who used a 10-yard handicap to win in the time of 21.7. However, Ira came back in the 100-yard dash final with a burst that brought the crowd to its feet as he set a meet record of 1:37 despite a very slow start.

The littel sprint man, who will make the trip to Russia as a member of the U. S. track team at the end of this month, gave away as much as eight yards and still was able to rip Bill Jefferson (seven yards) of Bennett AC and Harry Rouse (five yards) of Elmira at the wire.

Two Benedictines Will Be Ordained By Bishop Kearney

Two young men of the Benedictine order, Rev. James Kelly and Rev. Basil DePinto, of Mount Saviour Monastery will be ordained to the Holy Priesthood by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney on Friday, July 25. The ceremony will take place in the chapel of Our Lady Queen of Peace at the monastery starting at 10 a.m.

Father James Kelly of Dansville is solemnly professed and Brother Basil DePinto has taken his first vows in the order.

Father Kelly is the son of Mrs. Clement Kelly of Dansville, and the late Mr. Kelly. He entered Mount Saviour monastery in 1951 and made his novitiate at the Abbey of St. Eloi du Lac in Canada. After his first vows, which he took at Mount Saviour, he was sent in 1954 to the International Benedictine College of St. Anselmo in Rome for his studies. He made his solemn profession at the Abbey of Monte Cassino in July 1956.

Brother DePinto of Jersey City entered the novitiate of the monastery in 1955 and took his first vows in Oct. 1956, after which he joined the other Mount Saviour students at St. Anselmo in Rome.

FATHER KELLY will sing his first Mass at Mount Saviour on Saturday, July 26 at 9 a.m. and in his home parish of St. Patrick's in Dansville, on the following Sunday. Brother Basil will sing his first Mass at Mount Saviour on Sunday, July 27 at 9 a.m. and in his home parish on Sunday, August 3.

Brothers Christopher and Joseph made their oblation before Compline last evening. They were questioned by the Superior as to their willingness to renounce the secular life for the monastic life. On declaring their readiness to do so, they read the formula of their promises. Following this they were clothed in the long scapular.

John Henley of Louisville, Kentucky will be received as an oblate novice before Compline Saturday, July 12.

After presenting himself formally as an applicant for the monastic life, his feet will be washed by the Superior of the monastery.

2 New Seminary Rectors Served On Conesus Faculty

Conesus—Two priests of the Society of the Divine Word who were at one time stationed at the Divine Word Seminary, Conesus, N.Y. were named rectors of seminaries of the order according to word received here from the S.V.D. Generalate Headquarters in Rome.

For the past 17 years, Father Hahner was Director of Vocations for the Eastern Province of the Society with residence at Girard, Pa. He was ordained at Techny, Ill. in 1937.

Father Malin was Assistant Provincial for the Eastern Province for the past six years and Prefect of the Seminarians at the Divine Word Seminary, Girard, Pa. for the past ten years. He was ordained at Techny in 1937.

Both priests were graduated from the eighth grade of St. Joseph Cathedral School, La Crosse, Wis., in 1923.
