Teen-Age Pitfalls Cited For Parents

Dangers to youth at drive-in theaters and from street
corner gangs are spotlighted in the "Principal's Perspective,"
distributed by Our Lady of
Mercy High School, Rochester.
The article states:

"Summer is a time for whole-
some relaxing, not sinful indul-
gences. With this thought in
mind parents should double check
the recreation haunts of sons and
daughters. Certain places in
themselves legitimate, may prove
harmful morally to teenagers in
their insecure emotional years.

"WE ARE particularly con-
cerned with drive-in theaters and
the conduct of teenagers on their
nightly excursions there. Morals
are thrown away too often in the
dark cars and great harm comes
to amorous couples. To forbid
attendance at such places after
dark is like locking the barn
after the horse is gone. A
moral heart is not repaired as
easily as a stolen horse is re-
placed.

"Boys who hang out on street
corners have always earned a
mild contempt from society. But
today groups of girls are often
seen idling on the streets or clus-
tered with boys at ice cream
stores. We consider such public
conduct unbefitting a lady; the
corner is neither the place nor
the moral climate for the dignity
and virtue of a good girl."

Montezuma Pastor

'Trappist On Thruway'

In a little village of some three
to four hundred people about 60
miles from the heart of Roches-
ter, just inside of the Cayuga
County line, resides a priest who
has been the shepherd of a coun-
try parish for the last 21 years.
The priest, who just celebrated
his 35th anniversary in the ser-
vice of his Lord is the Rev. John
A. Guy, pastor of St. Michael's
Church, Montezuma, and St.
John's Church, Port Byron.

As in most country parishes,
the number of residents has
changed very little since Father
Guy was first assigned here, but
the goodness and charity of the
people has increased since this
quiet, unassuming priest arrived.

When Father Guy first arrived
— in the middle of the depres-
sion — the average collection on
Sunday was \$7 in Montezuma
and \$16 in Port Byron. Now it
is \$35 and \$55 in the respective
towns.

Visitors to his parish usually
find him with his prayer book
or in his library, tending to the

needs of the parish property in
his relaxation.

Father Guy was named Mon-
tezuma pastor in 1937. He is now
baptizing the off-spring of the
children he baptized twenty
years ago when he first came to
this farmland community that
now numbers about 70 Catholics
in Montezuma and 95 in the mis-
sion hamlet of Port Byron.

Traveling the seven square
miles in his parish has never
been a problem to Father Guy.
"There has never been a Sunday
that I haven't been able to get
to my mission in Port Byron,"
he said. "While we get snow
during the winter, this area is
in a relatively mild zone, where
the snow seems to surround us
but never really infiltrates us."

A NATIVE of Clyde, Father
Guy believes his background for
he does not take any active inter-
est in fishing and hunting, which
form a major part of the activi-
ty in the spare time of the men
in the area.

His parish, founded over 100
years ago, but assigned to the
Rochester Diocese in 1902, is free
and clear of mortgages. The pres-
ent church edifice was dedicated
by Rochester's first bishop, the
late Bishop McQuaid in 1908, dur-
ing the pastorate of Father John
J. Cosgrove, the church's first
pastor during its Rochester Dioc-
esan history.

Father Cosgrove, an eminent
speaker during his day, was pas-
tor from 1902 until his death in
1928, when Father Joseph Guil-
foill succeeded him. Father Guil-
foill remained pastor until he was
replaced by Father John F. Neary
in 1932. When Father Neary was
made pastor of St. Michael's
Church, Lyons in 1937, Father
Guy was named to replace him.

When he isn't ministering to
the needs of his parish, Father
Guy can usually be found working
around his rectory, which over-
looks the Thruway. The noise?
"It doesn't bother me at all,"
Father Guy said.

Close on his heels at all times
in his rectory is his companion,
an Irish setter named "Rusty."

fall.

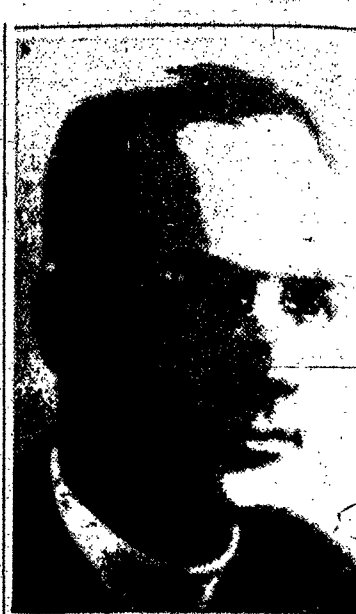
FATHER ESSER was hono-
