Pilgrims Converge On Shrine Of Jesuit Martyrs

Midland, Ont. — Modern pilgrims have started their annual convergence on the Canadian Canterbury at the Shrine of the North American Martyrs near here. They are coming to honor, by praise and petition, eight 17th Century Jesuit saints put to death while preaching the gospel to Huron and Iroquois tribes.

The shrine, on a hill overlooking Georgian Bay, a part of Lake Huron, is at the site of the old mission residence of Ste-Marie-Among-the-Hurons where six of the eight martyrs lived and two of them were buried.

The weekend of June 23 saw bus loads of pilgrims from Rochester, N.Y., and Milwaukee, Wis., staying overnight at the Shrine hostel.

Numerically dominating the early pilgrim groups were over 8,000 schoolchildren from 141 Ontario Public and Separate Schools.

Institute Changes Dorm Facilities

Rochester Business Institute will abandon four dormitories and house its out-of-town women students on two floors of the Richford Hotel, within easy walking distance of the Clinton Ave. S. school, beginning in September.

Under the new program, announced by Ernest W. Veigel Jr., president of the school, the second and third floors of the hotel will become dormitory sections completely isolated from the rest of the building. House mothers will supervise the quarters and the usual rules, including "lights out" at 11 p.m. will prevail, Veigel said.

Work Training Program Will Mark Anniversary

The Work Adjustment Training Program for retarded young adults at the Genesee Settlement House will celebrate its second year of operation as a pilot project on Oct. 8.

This program has pioneered in accepting retarded young adults who have been dismissed from other work training facilities within the community.

SEVERAL UNITS involving community interaction were planned and put into effect. One of these, a food handlers training course was done jointly by the health educator of the Rochester Health Bureau and the director of programs for the retarded at Genesee Settlement House. A work book for use with this course was developed by Mrs. Carl Chamberlain and Mrs. William Foster and illustrated by Mrs. Grant Haist. Letters of achievement were presented by the Health Bureau to the young people who completed their training in this area. Three-fourths of the students are now employed as food service workers.

Within the past year field work placements on a supervised basis were added. A noticeable decrease in the amount of time required for trainees to adjust on a job has resulted from this type of training.

Another feature of this program includes hiring of special-

ists in various fields to teach a special number of lessons to the trainees and their supervisors. This has proved successful and has made it possible to provide a rich curriculum at a limited cost.

The supervising teacher then carries on the daily repetitive type of teaching necessary with these young adults. Course making, photographic coloring and nursery school aide training are areas presently included in the program.

THE LOCAL Division of Vocational Rehabilitation office has cooperated in referrals and with financial authorizations when possible. This program is the only one of its kind within Monroe County.

Genesee Settlement is a group work agency of the Rochester Catholic Charities and is currently doing pioneer work with retardates from three to 34 years of age.

Rochester Nun Named Supervisor

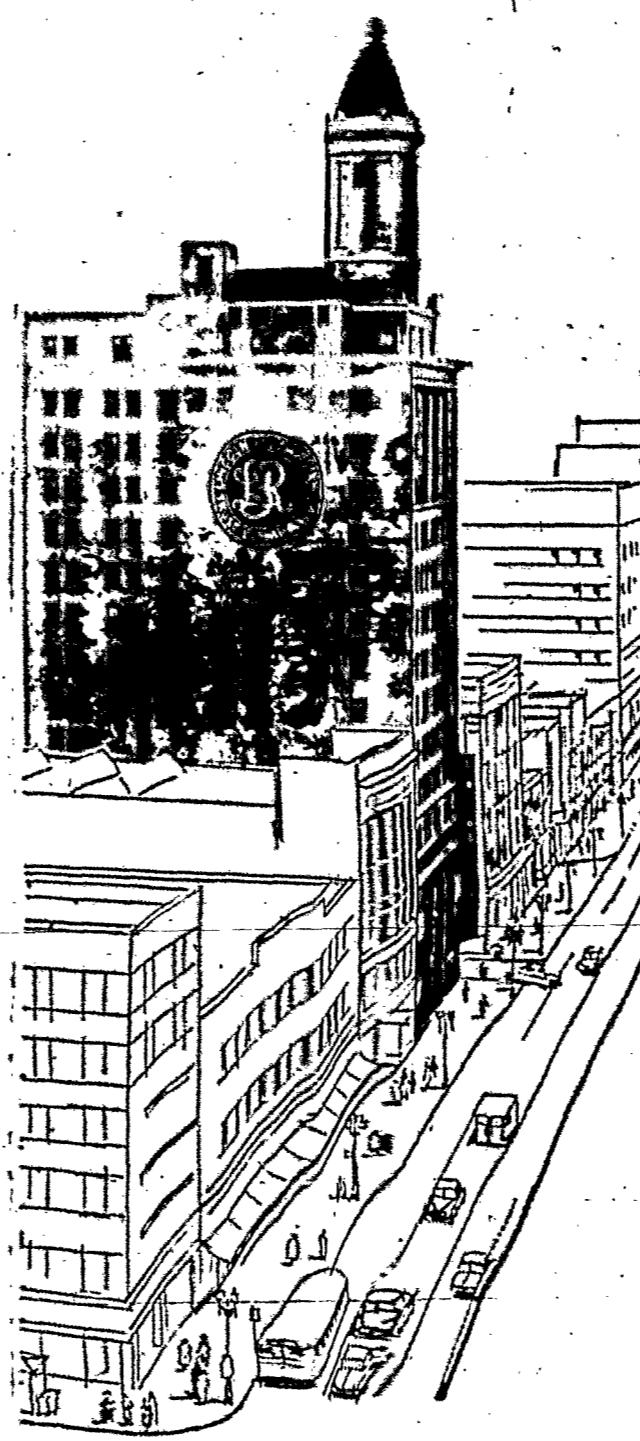
