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2 New Seminary Rectors Served On Conesus Faculty

Conesus—Two priests of the Society of the Divine Word who were at one time stationed at the Divine Word Seminary, Conesus, N.Y., were named rectors of seminaries of the order according to word received here from the S.V.D. Generalate Headquarters in Rome.

They are: the Very Rev. Walter Hafner, S.V.D. named rector of the Divine Word Seminary, Bordentown, N.J., and the Very Rev. Charles Malin, S.V.D. to become rector of the Divine Word Seminary at East Troy, Wis.

Rigorous Order Reports 20 Applicants

Fresno, Calif.—(NC)—Twenty Americans have applied for membership in one of the Church's oldest and most austere religious communities which is coming to the United States for the first time.

Known as the Camaldolese, the community will soon establish a hermitage on a site overlooking the Pacific Ocean.

THE CAMALDOLESE, who are hermits, will establish themselves in a heavily wooded and secluded part of the Santa Lucia mountains in Monterey county, about 55 miles south of Monterey City.

The 700-acre of mountainside land — to be known as "New Camaldoli — the Hermitage of the Immaculate Heart of Mary" — were purchased for the community by American benefactors.

The Order of Camaldoli, an offshoot of the Benedictines, was founded by St. Romuald in 1012. Each member lives in a separate house. The houses are spread 20 to 30 feet apart, clustered around their church.

Camaldolese live alone except for daily Mass and recitation of the Divine Office. Like Trappists and Carthusians, they do not eat meat.

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Liturgy Study Week Set For Cincinnati

Cincinnati—(NC)—Top authorities on the liturgy from across the nation will gather here from August 18 through 21 for the 19th annual North American Liturgical Week.

Archbishop Karl J. Alter, of Cincinnati, host to the convention, will give the opening address of welcome and will offer pontifical Mass in the Cincinnati cathedral to bring the Week to a close.

The pageant, like the talks and discussions of the following three days, will follow the theme of the Liturgical Week, "The Church Year."

Father Benedict Ehmman, pastor of St. Mary of the Lake Church, Watkins Glen, N.Y., will speak on "The Background and Basis of the Liturgical Year."

Benedictine Father Damasus Winzen Mount Saviour Priory, near Elmira, N.Y., will speak on "The Liturgical Year in Fruition."

New Air Mail Stamp Due Aug. 1

The new regular 7-cent air mail stamp for use when new postage rates become effective August 1, 1958, features a silhouette view of the wing spread and fuselage of a composite jet airplane of the most advanced type which will soon be in commercial use on the nation's major airlines.

Reproduced in blue and white, the stamp was designed by William H. Buckley of New York, a member of the Department's Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee, with lettering by Sam Marsh.

The stamp will go on first day sale in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania on Thursday, July 31, at the annual convention of the American Air Mail Society, Philadelphia, incidentally, was one of the stops on the first flight of air mail from Washington to New York City 40 years ago on May 15, 1918.

On August 1, 1958, the new 7-cent air mail stamp will be available in the nation's 36,605 post offices in sheet form and in 500 and 3,000 stamp coils.

Tiny Book Prints Of Our Fathers

Maine—(NC)—A miniature booklet measuring only a little more than six thousandths of a square inch, containing the Lord's Prayer in seven languages, has been placed on sale here.

The 14-page booklet, so tiny that three copies can be placed on a penny, is being sold to raise funds to rebuild the Johann Gutenberg Museum here, which was destroyed during the war.

The Our Father is printed in English, German, French, Dutch, Swedish, Spanish and "American," as the publishers call it.

Italy Reports On Non-Catholics

Rome—(NC)—The Italian Ministry of Interior has announced that Italy has 120,000 non-Catholics who are members of 48 different denominations.

Widows May Be Eligible For Federal Pensions

Frank W. Schoenherr, 223 Redfern Drive Rochester 20, N.Y., announced today that the National Association of Retired Civil Service Employees of which he is local secretary, is seeking to "find a widow" or widower of a Federal employee or retiree who died prior to Feb. 29, 1958.
