

'German Day' Slated By City Federation

Annual "German Day" of Rochester's German-American citizens will take place at Elser's Grove, 1246 Buffalo Road, Sunday, August 3 under the auspices of the Federation of German American Societies.

Part of the proceeds will be turned over to relief agencies of West Germany where more than 10 millions of displaced persons include many who are still in dire need.

William Wittmann is president of the federation composed of 20 different societies. General chairman of the German Day celebration is John Boerscheim.

A program of choral singing and folk dancing will be presented. West Germany Consul C. Julius Hoffmann will speak.

Two Benedictines Will Be Ordained By Bishop Kearney

Two young men of the Benedictine order, Rev. James Kelly and Rev. Basil DePinto, of Mount Saviour Monastery will be ordained to the Holy Priesthood by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney on Friday, July 25. The ceremony will take place in the chapel of Our Lady Queen of Peace at the monastery starting at 10 a.m.

Father James Kelly of Dansville is solemnly professed and Brother Basil DePinto has taken his first vows in the order.

Father Kelly is the son of Mrs. Clement Kelly of Dansville and the late Mr. Kelly. He entered Mount Saviour monastery in 1931 and made his novitiate at the Abbey of St. Benoit du Lac in Canada. After his first vows, which he took at Mount Saviour, he was sent in 1934 to the International Benedictine College of S. Anselmo in Rome for his studies. He made his solemn profession at the Abbey of Monte Cassino in July 1936.

Brother DePinto of Jersey City entered the novitiate at the monastery in 1935 and took his first vows in Oct. 1936, after which he joined the other Mount Saviour students at S. Anselmo in Rome.

FATHER KELLY will sing his first Mass at Mount Saviour on Saturday, July 26 at 9 a.m. and in his home parish of St. Patrick's in Dansville, on the following Sunday. Brother Basil will sing his first Mass at Mount Saviour on Sunday, July 27 at 9 a.m. and in his home parish on Sunday, August 3.

Brothers Christopher and Joseph made their oblation before Compline last evening. They were questioned by the Superior as to their willingness to renounce the secular life for the monastic life. On declaring their readiness to do so, they read the formula of their promises. Following this they were clothed in the long scapular.

John Henley of Louisville, Kentucky will be received as an oblate novice before Compline Saturday, July 12.

After presenting himself formally as an applicant for the monastic life, his feet will be washed by the Superior of the monastery, Very Rev. Damasius Winzen. Each member of the community will then kiss his feet as a symbol of his reception into the monastic family in the name of Christ. He will be given the short scapular of a novice and receive at that time the name by which he will be known in the monastery.

A sum of \$1,000 each was donated to fight heart disease, muscular dystrophy, cancer and infantile paralysis.

'Skip One Meal' To Feed Needy, Germans Told

Nuremberg — (RNS) — Catholic Bishops in Germany are planning to initiate a nationwide drive for the world's hungry, Heinrich Koeppler, Secretary General of the Central Committee of German Catholics, top organization of Catholics lay groups and movements in this country, announced here.

He said an appeal will be issued by the German hierarchy next Lent, calling upon believers to skip one meal regularly and donate the money saved to help feed those in want.

The drive is to be conducted under the theme "Crusade Against Hunger in the World" and will include not only charitable relief but also large-scale economic programs.

Aid-the-hungry drives have already been conducted in Germany this year, but on a regional or group level. Organizations sponsoring such objectives included the Federation of German Catholic Youth and the German branch of the Pax Christi (Peace for Christ) movement.

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
