

New Chairman For Speakers Bureau

Appointment of Mrs. Bernard Lancer as chairman to succeed Mrs. Arthur P. Farren who resigned was announced at a meeting of the speakers bureau sponsored by the Monroe County Council of Catholic Women, by Mrs. Lawrence P. Weis, president.

Crusaders Mission Report

Aquinas Students Raise \$22,800

A grand total of \$22,818.14 and contributions toward erection of mission chapels in Ghana, West Africa and in South India were reported by the Aquinas Institute Catholic Students Mission Crusade through its moderator the Rev. John Wilson, C.S.B., today.

The Aquinas students through homeroom collections, and Aquinas Mission Bouts accumulated \$4,284.88 in excess of last year's report. Homeroom 314 with \$1,791.35 topped the juniors and seniors and homeroom 119 with \$1,381.92 was high among freshmen and sophomores.

Box office, elimination bouts and patrons of the Mission Bouts resulted in \$3,051.30.

THE CHAPEL in Ghana for which Aquinas is raising \$10,000 over a five-year period will be erected at the University of Achimota.

Appeal for Aquinas contribution to the chapel most of which expense will be born by the government, came from the Rev. John R. Koster, S.V.D. Father Koster wrote that the chapel will be dedicated to St. Thomas Aquinas "as an expression of our deep gratitude for the outstanding assistance which your group is giving us."

The Crusaders also received an acknowledgment of \$300 sent to the Rev. Justin Diravim, rector of St. Augustine Seminary, Trichinopoly, South India to build a church there in honor of St. Thomas of Aquinas.

Father Diravim who visited Catholic schools in the Rochester diocese and was a guest of the Rev. Francis Feeney, pastor of St. James Church, several years ago, reported that building of the church in his mission was accomplished only after many setbacks.

"Thanks to the generosity of your Crusade," the native Indian priest wrote, "We have now a monumental church—a pride to our poor Catholics."

His next project, Father Diravim said, was a school, "a nursery of vocations to the priesthood," for which he will need \$1,000.

In making the report of the Aquinas Mission unit, Father Wilson noted that since 1937-1938, Aquinas students have raised a total of \$235,289.14 for the missions.

Latin America Notes Progress In Vocations

Washington—(NC)—Despite a rapid increase in population, there are indications that progress is being made in Latin America toward solving the problem of the scarcity of priests.

Statistics compiled here by Father William J. Gibbons of Loyola College, Baltimore, Md., and Noticias Catolicas, the Spanish language edition of N.C.W.C. News Service, indicate that although each priest in Latin America still is entrusted with the spiritual care of about 5,000 people, the situation is gradually improving in some parts of the continent.

In Central America and Mexico the proportion of faithful for every priest dropped from a high of 9,028 in 1950 to 5,077 five years later.

During the same time in the Caribbean islands the number of faithful cared for by one priest decreased from 9,464 to an average of 6,139.

Figures also indicate that countries with higher educational and living standards reflect a better religious situation.

In Chile, for example, where 80 per cent of the population can read and write, each priest takes care of the spiritual needs of about 3,000 people. But in Guatemala, where 70 per cent of the people are illiterate, the proportion rises to 11,539 faithful for each pastor.

Red Leaders Chided, Not Enough Atheism

Moscow — (RNS) — Communist Party and youth organization leaders in the Leningrad region have been chided for not paying sufficient attention to atheistic propaganda. They were warned that "the last remnants of the distant capitalist past — religion — are still alive and widespread."

THE REBUKE came from the news paper, Leningradskaya Pravda, which said "It should not be believed that this capitalist survival is dead or harmless."

"Marxism-Leninism," the paper said, "teaches that religious beliefs will not disappear of their own accord. Careful and stubborn work is needed fully to liberate the consciousness of the believers from the narcotics of religion."

The paper called for training more lecturers in atheism and the promotion of regular and religious meetings and discussions.
