DOINGS AT THE DALY'S Bread-and-Butter Talk

By Mary Malley Daly Several weeks ago, in the Catholic press, one of our fellow columnists, Msgr. Irving DeBlanc reported a request for help in "making do" with an inadequate income in these days of rising costs. This columnist has received like requests from readers.



"Not by bread alone..." of course, but food is a basic problem in rearing a family. "How do you feed 'em?", one of our correspondents writes. "We have five growing children - and how their appetites are growing! My husband is laid off temporarily so that it's all outgo and no income. "He makes good pay when he's working but we won't have anything left by the time the company takes him back unless we retrench radically. The retrenchment, I figure, is my job. Can you help me?"

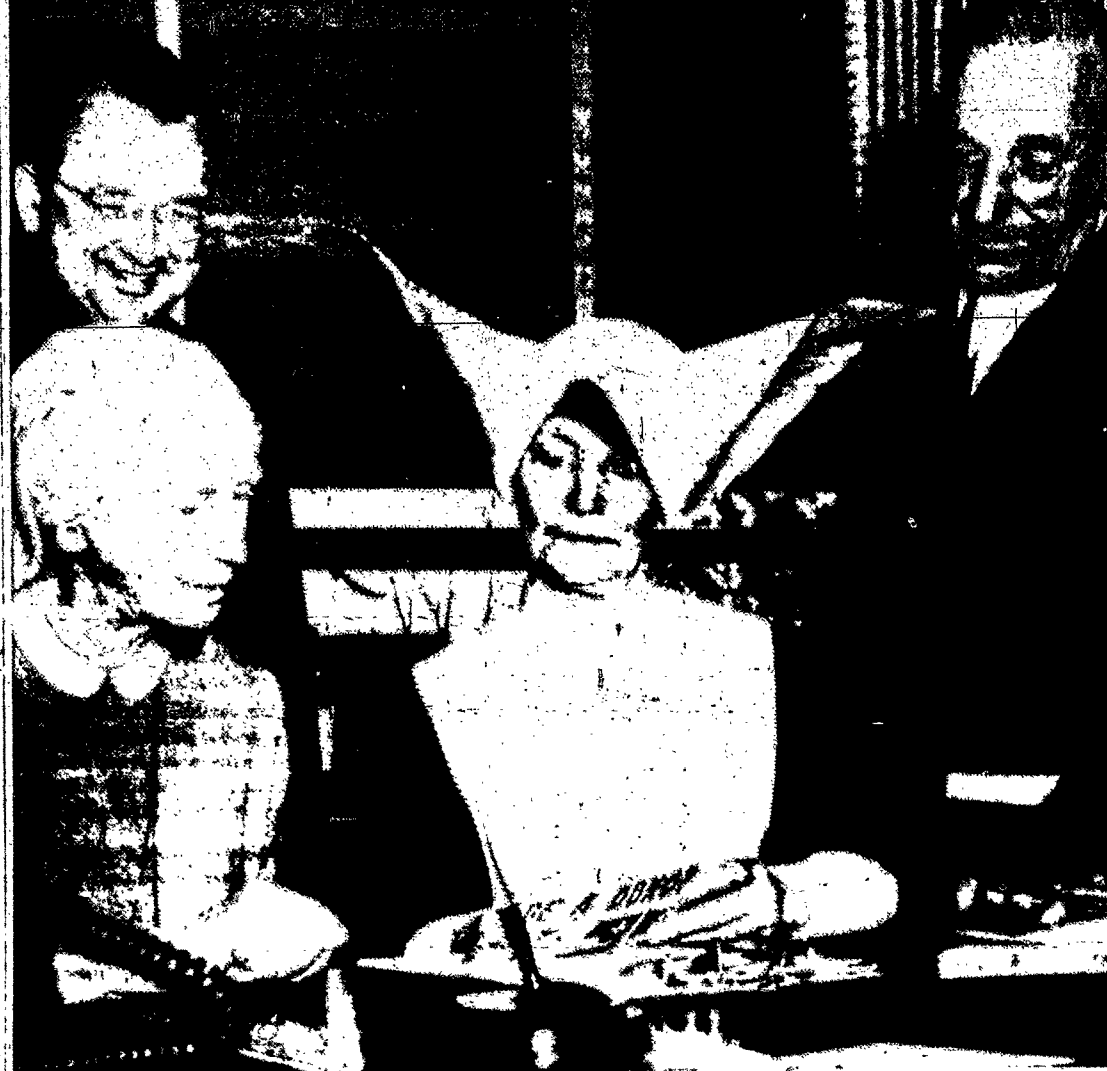
And another: "My husband has seasonal occupation but this year the seasonal let-off has continued on and on. We have to cut expenses at home. However, every time I go to the grocery store, I spend between \$10 and \$12 for our family of eight - and the food only lasts a few days (this includes milk, laundry supplies and the like.) How can I help my husband? He pretends not to be worried, but I know he is."

These are but two samples of letters with the same tenor: how to keep down the outgo until the income catches up.

UNDOUBTEDLY these women as all of us do, read the women's sections in the daily papers looking for economy tips, until time comes when a daily paper becomes not a necessity but a luxury. For real help in the battle of the budget, we've found that the paper carrying the week-end food ads is a must.

There, spread-out on your own dining room or kitchen table, you can study it like a research report and a road map. Chain stores and independents are vying with one another for your food dollars and you are the supreme judge.

You are the comparative shopper and by careful weighing of values and shopping around you can save real money. A survey conducted by a metropolitan daily in one of our larger cities says that "officially, chain store buyers say bluntly that housewives can change the price picture overnight if

Our Catholic Schools

As anyone with even a passing knowledge of modern vocabulary realizes, group therapy is a phrase which has become increasingly significant. Resorted to in the simplest terms, group therapy is a group of people who meet to discuss those and in the sharing of experiences and problems, the individual often is able to arrive at a clearer knowledge of himself and of his problems.

Over the past several months I have read in Catholic periodicals articles which might be interpreted as a sort of extended group therapy. The articles I refer to are those in which a Catholic mother, often in a witty, but none the less heartless manner, complains about Catholic schools.

Perhaps a certain therapeutic advantage is attached to an individual's vocalizing all the petty grievances and annoyances she has saved over the school year; but in my opinion, considerable more harm than good is done when the over-all picture is considered.

MY IMMEDIATE interest in all this stems from an article I read in the July 12 issue of America. In this article a mother with a distinct literary flair sets forth, in a most entertaining manner, all her annoyances at Sister.

In common with all articles of this nature, the writing reminds me of an old time blunderbuss. The writer pulls the trigger and to school book rental practices; complaints fly off in all directions - from mission collections from subject matter to required attendance at the children's Sunday Mass; from lack of home work to lack of discipline.

Some of these are amusing in that I distinctly remember the years when parents were most vociferous in their complaints because the parochial
