Scheut Fathers Head Visits Diocese

The Very Rev. Francis Sereu, C.I.C.M., for more than three years a war prisoner of the Japanese and later a hostage of the Chinese communists, visited Rochester this week and told of the Red brutality in China.

Father Sereu is superior general of the Congregation of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, commonly known as the Scheut Fathers, with headquarters in Brussels, Belgium.

Prior to his appointment as superior general of the order, Father Sereu spent 27 years in China. During this time he spent three years in a Japanese concentration camp and in 1952 he was imprisoned by the communists for 93 days and then expelled from China.

THE HARSH treatment of prisoners by the communists was unbelievable according to the missionary.

"There is no freedom at all under communist rule," Father Sereu said. "Freedom of religion, free speech, free thought, no travel. For five years I could not even leave the town where I was stationed."

"Communism aims not only at the destruction of religion, but also to the complete destruction of human dignity."

The communists tried to destroy all religion and religion, according to the missionary, is now being destroyed. His own bishop, Bishop De Smet, died in prison in 1951 and the Chinese priest, who is now in prison.

FATHER Sereu visited the United States following a tour of his missions in the Caribbean area. The first American visitation of the order is scheduled to open in Missionhurst, Arlington, Va. this year.

He extended his trip to Rochester to visit relatives whom he had previously known only through correspondence. While in Rochester he stayed at the home of the Sereu family on Ferris St.

The head of the Scheut Fathers also visited the Carmelite Monastery while in Rochester. Two of his sisters are Carmelites.

A brother of the missionary has 10 children with five of them in the order. Founded in 1852 by religious life including two Carmelites and a Trappist. Following his return to East-Prussia, Father Sereu will tour his mission work.
