

Three Sisters Profess Vows

Three Sisters of the Daughters of Mary Order of Leuca, Italy, took their final profession of vows in special ceremonies held last Sunday at the Society of the Divine Word Mission at Conesus.

The Nuns, all from Italy, are Sisters Luciana Antonello, Naomi Carbone and Veronica Battista. Very Rev. Francis X. Borrono, S.S.P., superior of the Society of St. Paul community at Derby, N.Y., celebrated the High Mass sung by the Divine Word Seminarians and conducted the profession of vows.

The order, who do domestic work at the Seminary located above Hemlock Lake, generally are engaged in social work, operating hospitals, in many places including Genoa, Italy, where the mother house is located. They also do work in the Buffalo Diocese.

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donors—one of whom was a third grade boy who helped with the painting," he added.

Among the main features of the remodeled convent are the chapel and the community room.

New ceramic stations now line the walls of the chapel along with new stained glass windows with cherry wood paneling covering the walls. A wall was torn down so that the community room was doubled in size, giving each Sister of Notre Dame, who teach in the school, ample room for her own extracurricular work.

FRIENDS raised also enabled Monsignor Vogt to fence off part of the yard to give the Sisters a peaceful garden spot.

A new feature in the church was the donation of a set of 33 chimes by the parishioners.

MSGR. VOGT, is the fourth pastor in the church's 91 year history. The parish was established under the care of the Redemptorist Fathers in 1877 and in 1869, Bishop McQuaid, Rochester's first bishop, appointed Msgr. Fidelis Oberholzer as pastor. Father Jacob Staub was appointed pastor in 1901 on the death of Msgr. Oberholzer.

The 1955 fund drive was started by the late Msgr. William F. Stauder, pastor of Holy Redeemer for 31 years, until his death in 1955. The drive was successfully concluded under the pastorage of Msgr. Vogt.

One of the most beautiful churches in the diocese, Holy Redeemer boasts an organ that came from the Pittsburgh home of Andrew Mellon. The present organist—again reflecting the widespread nationalities in the parish—is of Bohemian descent. He also teaches the Angel Chorus.

Orders Mark Founders Feasts

The Church celebrates this week the feasts of two of its most illustrious saints—both of whom founded religious orders represented in the Rochester Diocese.

On Thursday, July 31, the church celebrated the feast of St. Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) who teach at Rochester's newest high school, McQuaid Jesuit High School on Clinton Ave. S., Rochester.

BORN IN Spain in 1491, St. Ignatius served with the army in his younger days and it was while he was recovering from a wound that he received in battle against the French that he resolved to spend his life in penance for his sins.

After three days of self examination in 1521 at the famous Spanish sanctuary of Montserrat, he confessed and dramatically gave his clothes to the poor, donned a garment of sack cloth and suspended his sword and dagger at Our Lady's Altar.

It was while doing penance for his sins at the nearby cave of Manresa that he began to make notes that developed into his famous book, "The Spiritual Exercises."

St. Ignatius founded the Society of Jesus in 1534 after 12 years of poverty and misunderstanding. Among his first followers were St. Peter Faber and St. Francis Xavier.

The Jesuits are famous in the United States for their valiant efforts to convert the Indians. Among those who first came here were Father Marquette, whose explorations helped carve history in the New World, and

St. Isaac Jogues and his companions who were brutally beaten and then burned at the stake by the Iroquois and Mohawk Indians in New York State.

THE JESUITS were invited to this Diocese by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney to start a high school in 1919. Under the direction of Father James R. Barnhill, S.J., rector of McQuaid, the school on Clinton Ave. S. was completed after first holding classes in the old Catholic High School.

ON SATURDAY, Aug. 2, the church celebrates the feast of St. Ignatius' feast of St. Ignatius, one of its most famous moral theologians. St. Ignatius' feast is celebrated in the Diocese of Rochester.

Founder of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (R.S. Notre Dame Retreat House for Redemptorist Fathers), St. Ignatius was born in Naples in 1591 and is recognized as one of the foremost missionaries of the 16th century, along with St. Leonard, Gerald J. Wielecki, CSSR, and St. Paul of the Cross.

St. Ignatius was a model workman and found throughout the Christian world his life's mission. He is noted for his professional skill and for his study of Theology, interpreting it so that it can be understood by the ordinary lay person.

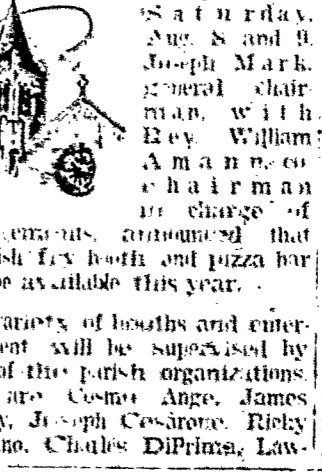

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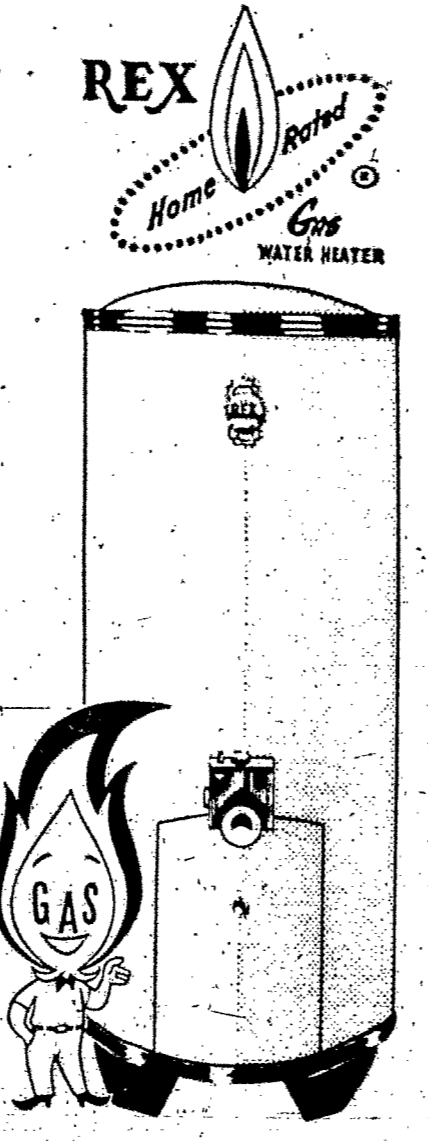
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
