## Orders Mark Founders Feasts

The Church celebrates this week the feasts of two of its most illustrious Saints—both of whom founded religious orders represented in the Rochester Diocese.

On Thursday, July 31, the church celebrated the feast of St. Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) who teach at Rochester's newest high school, McQuaid Jesuit High School on Clinton Ave. S., Rochester.

BORN IN Spain in 1491, St. Ignatius served with the army in his younger days and it was while he was recovering from a wound that he received in battle against the French that he resolved to spend his life in penance for his misdeeds.

After three days of self examination in 1522 at the famous Spanish sanctuary of Montserrat, he confessed and dramatically gave his clothes to the poor, donned a garment of sack cloth and suspended his sword and dagger at Our Lady's Altar.

It was while doing penance for his sins at the nearby cave of Manresa that he began to make notes that developed into his famous book, "The Spiritual Exercises."

St. Ignatius founded the Society of Jesus in 1534 after 12 years of poverty and misunderstanding. Among his first followers were St. Peter Faber and St. Francis Xavier.

The Jesuits are famous in the United States for their valiant efforts to convert the Indians. Among those who first came here were Father Marquette, whose explorations helped carve history in the New World, and St. Isaac Jogues and his companions, who were brutally beaten and then burned at the stake by the Iroquois and Mohawk Indians in New York State. Known as the North American Martyrs, a shrine in their honor was erected at Auriesville, N.Y.

There are a total of 28 colleges and universities operated by the Jesuits in the United States. They also list 41 preparatory or high schools and their institutions are represented in 22 states and the District of Columbia.

THE JESUITS were invited to this Diocese by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney to start a high school in 1949. Under the direction of Father James R. Barnett, S.J., rector of McQuaid, the school on Clinton Ave. S. was completed after first holding classes in the Old Cathedral High School.

ON SATURDAY, Aug. 2, the church celebrates the feast of one of its most famous moral theologians—St. Alphonsus Liguori, honored as one of the Doctors of the Church.

Founder of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (Redemptorist Fathers), St. Alphonsus was born in Naples in 1696 and is recognized as one of the foremost missionaries of the 18th century, along with St. Leonard and St. Paul of the Cross.

A victim of poor eyesight, St. Alphonsus nevertheless distinguished himself as a brilliant student. He received his degree as doctor of laws at the age of 16, although 20 was the age fixed by the statutes and at 27 was one of the leaders of the Neapolitan Bar.

St. Alphonsus was a model Christian throughout his life, his confessor claiming that he preserved his baptismal innocence till death. At the age of 26, he began to go constantly into society, but after receiving a crushing defeat in a law case that he was counsel for, he left the social life that he was leading and joined the Fathers of the Oratory.

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The Redemptorists came to Rochester before this Diocese was founded. Among the churches they organized are St. Boniface and St. Joseph's, Franklin St.

IN THIS Diocese, the Redemptorist Fathers now conduct the Notre Dame Retreat House for men on Alexander St. under the direction of Father Thomas J. Fallon, C.S.S.R., and St. Joseph's Church, whose pastor is Father Gerald J. Whelan, C.S.S.R.

Devoted mainly to mission work and found throughout the United States, the Redemptorists are noted for their confessional work and for their study of Theology, interpreting it so that it can be understood by the ordinary lay person.

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## Louisiana Cracks Down On New Orleans Clubs

Baton Rouge — (NC) — Gov. Earl K. Long has signed a bill passed by the state legislature which tightens anti-obscenity laws, especially in regard to burlesque performances.

The measure makes offenses felonies, not misdemeanors, and raises the penalty to a fine of \$1,000 or five years or both, not \$500 or two years or both.

THE BILL reportedly is aimed at night clubs in New Orleans which specialize in burlesque performances.

The New Orleans Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women supported passage of the bill, as did the Louisiana Parent-Teacher Association and various Protestant church groups.
