Rev. Anthony P. Lococo, C.S.B., has been appointed superior and principal of St. Charles College, Sudbury, Ontario. Father Lococo joined the faculty of Aquinas Institute in Sept., 1938, a year after the Basilian Fathers took over the administration of the boys Catholic high school.

IN 1940 HE was chosen head of the Latin department, a post he held until this year. He has often been chosen to serve on evaluating committees of the Middle States Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges.

Many teachers and principals have observed his classes to study his successful methods of teaching. In recent years he has conducted seminars in education for Basilian Scholastics at Strawberry Island, Summer home for the seminarians.

Father Toney celebrated his First Solemn Mass in St. Francis de Sales, Geneva and Father Blober in St. John the Evangelist Church, Greece.

Also enroute with them are Fathers Walter Maxey of New Rochelle, N.Y.; Dennis Lalley, Uniontown, Pa.; John Rich, Chicago and Charles Collins, Rochester, Mass.
