Holy Redeemer School prior to his studies at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminary, has been pastor here since 1951.

Ordained to the priesthood on June 6, 1925, he served as an assistant at St. Peter and Paul, St. Andrew, Rochester, St. Michael's, Rochester, St. John the Baptist, Elmira and St. Francis Xavier, Rochester, before being made pastor of St. Ignace Church in Naples.

FASTO: In Naples for 15 years, Father Sturmer succeeded the Rev. William F. Frank, Cohocton pastor, who died in 1931.

Farming is the major industry in this village, just as it is in most of the other communities in the gateway to the Southern Tier. And, like in all small farm towns, juvenile delinquency is pretty much unheard of here.

St. Plus Parish, which has about 20 families in it, once had

a parochial grade school back in the 19th century, but because of the smallness of the community, found that it could not be supported and so it was closed.

"This does not mean that the people didn't want it," Father Sturmer said, "but the expense of the upkeep of the church along with that of the school was too much of a financial burden to maintain, so the school had to be closed."

"But the lack of a school has not meant that the people have lost their religious fervor.

"I conduct release time classes both here and in Avoca and I find the children have a firm conviction in their faith which they obviously got from being brought up in good Christian homes," Father Sturmer added.
