

SCHOOL CIVICS CLUBS

Pupils Urged To Study Vocational Opportunities

What shall I be?
Rochester diocesan boys and girls in the upper grades will get help in answering this big question for themselves as they participate in the study and activities planned for the 1953-54 school year by the Catholic Civics Clubs of America.

A recommendation that this highly effective pupils activity be encouraged in the schools of this area was made this week by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles V. Boyle, diocesan superintendent of schools, in a letter sent to all principal school principals.

SPONSORED by the Commission on American Citizenship of The Catholic University of America, the Catholic Civics Clubs give boys and girls an opportunity

to put Christian social principles into action in their own lives. The Clubs engage in various community and civic projects.

In his letter to the principals Monsignor Boyle wrote "Civics club activities in our schools have been most helpful in developing social consciousness, a sense of responsibility and other desirable traits. . . . The clubs this year can be of real value to the future of all children."

The particularly practical and important subject of how to choose a suitable career will be the theme of study during the 1953-54 school year. The theme will develop around this slogan: "To Serve God and Neighbor Best, Find The Career Just Right for You."

IN THE OLD TESTAMENT God ordered the Jews to offer five kinds of sacrifice in reparation for their sins. The lambs and goats and calves were sacrificed were substitutes for sinners. Dying in their stead, the animals acknowledged that the sinners deserved to die.

THE SACRIFICES were the symbols and prefigures of Christ who was to substitute himself for us and die for our sins on the Cross. "God was in Christ, reconciling the world to himself, establishing in our hearts His message of reconciliation, instead of holding men to account for their sins." (2 Cor 5:19)

NOTHING GOOD COMES TO US but through sacrifice or another's suffering. Our mothers suffered and went to the very limit of death to give us birth. No piece of coal warms us without expending itself and being spent in the hearth to be our fire.

THE MERITS OF CHRIST do not apply to us unless we die to our lower selves and offer sacrifice for others as He did for us. Have you ever, for example, thought of doing any other person's work for him than saying the few words the priest gave you in confession? Have you ever offered yourself as a substitute for those who suffer in Communist prisons? How can we claim that the Chinese Catholics are our brethren unless we freely make a sacrifice to share their sorrow?

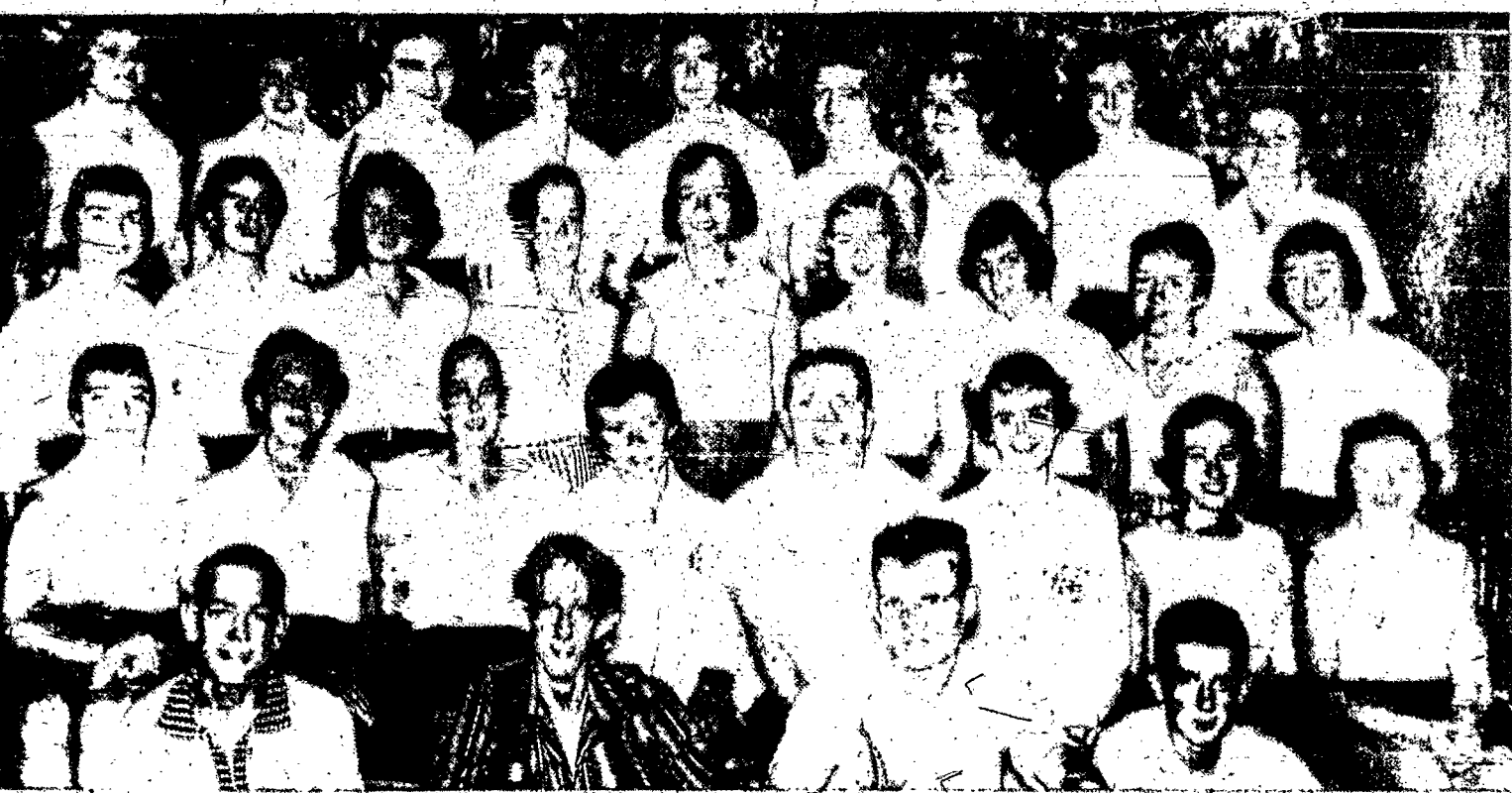
