### Drive Slated For Scout Work

A threefold increase in Boy and Girl Scouting in Rochester and Monroe County since the war has created an urgent need for expansion and improvement of camping and service facilities which will be financed through a \$1,497,000 United Scouting Development Fund campaign this fall.  
Howard T. Cumming, general campaign chairman, in announcing the campaign, said: "Today, out of our county population of 103,286 boys and girls of Scouting age, 28.5 percent, or 29,510 are enrolled. In 1945, the combined Boy and Girl Scout registration was 10,616, or 16.8 percent of the 62,774 boys and girls of Scout age."

**ASSERTING THAT Scout camping is "the Laboratory of citizenship in which the skills and knowledge acquired during the rest of the year are given full, practical application,"** Cumming added that "in their respective camping programs, Boy and Girl Scouts derive the greatest benefits in each organization's program of training our young people to take their places as steadfast citizens of tomorrow, imbued with a strong sense of integrity and respect for law and order and for the rights and opinions of others."

The county-wide campaign will be the first of its kind for the Girl Scouts since their organization in Rochester in 1918. Otellana Boy Scout Council has had one previous capital fund campaign in their 48-year history.  
"By agreement," Cumming said, "net proceeds after campaign and pledge collection expenses are met will be divided on the basis of the needs—55.3 percent for the Girl Scouts and 44.7 percent for the Boy Scouts. While each organization receives Community Chest allotments, these are for operating expenses only and cannot be used for capital, or construction-type improvements."  
Mrs. Alfred M. Doud, former president of the Girl Scouts of Rochester and Monroe County, and Mayor Peter Barry of Rochester, former vice-president of Otellana Boy Scout Council, are vice-chairmen as Cumming's aides.

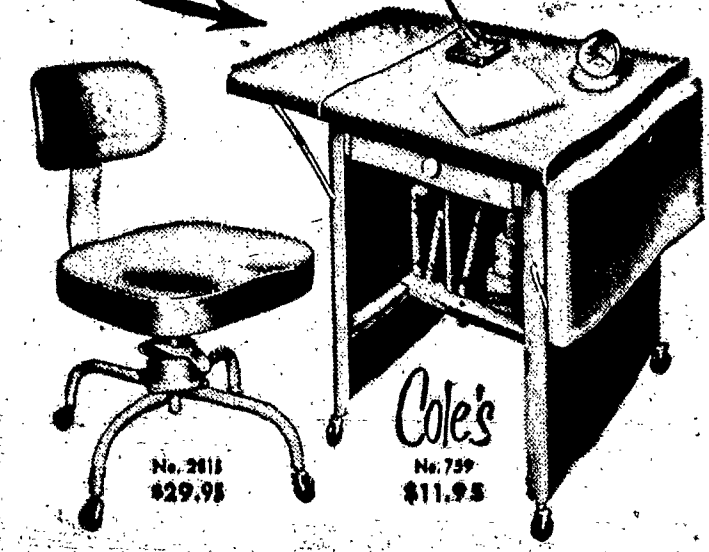
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**Canada Cardinal Praises 4-H Clubs**
