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Women Volunteers Topic For DCCW

The contributions of women volunteers—motivated by spiritual concerns—to the improvement of their communities and the nation—will be reviewed at the 29th national convention of the National Council of Catholic Women, September 20 to 24 in St. Louis.

A delegation from the Diocese of Rochester is being organized. Official delegate from the Rochester Diocesan Council is Mrs. F. P. Hommel of Watkins Glenn with Miss Stella Zawadzki of Rochester, alternate.

Some 10,000 delegates are expected at the five-day meeting being held in St. Louis' auditorium at the invitation of Archbishop Joseph E. Ritter of St. Louis and the St. Louis Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women.

NCCW EXECUTIVE Secretary Margaret Mesley announced that Monsignor Paul F. Tanner, general secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, parent body of NCCW, is invited to discuss "Women's Service to the Church."

He will be joined by four women noted for their personal careers of service: Jane Hoey, New York and Washington, D. C., director of the Kerby Foundation and former director of the Bureau of Public Assistance of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare; Mrs. Floyd W. Lee, San Mateo, New Mexico, U. S. delegate to the Inter-American Commission of Women; Sister Maria del Rey, public relations director for Maryknoll Sisters; and Congresswoman Leonor Sullivan, St. Louis.

Miss Hoey's topic is woman's service to the local community; Mrs. Lee's, the world community; Sister Maria del Rey, the missions; and Mrs. Sullivan, government. Miss Hoey has worked through the Kerby Foundation to

encourage understanding and acceptance by Catholic laymen and women of their role in the civic life of democratic society. Mrs. Lee was appointed to the Inter-American Commission, a specialized agency of the Organization of American States, by President Eisenhower in 1952.

SISTER MARIA DEL REY entered the Maryknoll order in 1923. She is the author of *Her Name is Mercy*, in and out the Americas, N.Y. in Red Cuba, and Bernis-Buenos Aires.

Mrs. Sullivan, the first woman member of Congress from Missouri, was elected to her first term in 1932, as a candidate for the seat occupied by the late husband from 1910 to 1931.

Church Burns Mortgage

Sodus—Burning of the church's mortgage was celebrated by the Rev. William Lammers, pastor of the Church of the Epiphany, Sodus and his parishioners at a parish picnic held at the Sodus Fruit Farm.

The parish picnic under the chairmanship of Robert Vandevelde also marked the success of the Auction-Bazaar held in July which helped to make the final payment on the mortgage.

Trustees are John Doyle and Martin Leckinger. The entire church property was declared completely debt free and Father Lammers announced he is planning to make some necessary improvements.

THE PRESENT church, it was recalled at the picnic celebration is now located at 105 Main St., Sodus. Originally Mass was celebrated in a hall in Catlin's block some 45 years ago. Monsignor Joseph V. Curtin, now of Clyde, was one of the first missionary priests to come to Sodus to celebrate Mass for approximately 12 families.

Parishioners purchased the Rogers' estate at the corner of Main and Newark Street and planned to use the house as the rectory and build the church on

the adjoining lot. In the spring of 1923 under the leadership of the Rev. Charles F. Shay, construction of the church was begun. In August, 1923, it was dedicated with the Rev. John Selinger presiding. Original trustees were Charles Fletcher and Joseph Doyle. Their families are still members of Church of the Epiphany.

Other pastors carrying on the work were the Rev. Daniel D. O'Rourke and the Rev. Ralph Meyers, it was recalled.

IN 1884 under the direction of Rev. James O'Connell, now of Ontario, the parishioners cleared out the basement of the rectory and made it into a parish hall. It is now used for religious instructions, meetings, and suppers. The Holy Name Society with Robert Zecher, president and the Rosary-Aitar Society headed by Mrs. Sigmund Piekunka, president, meet in the parish hall.

Father Lammers is also pastor of St. Rose Church, Sodus Point.

George Croston Rites Conducted

Burial was in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery. Final absolution was imparted at the grave by Father James F. Doyle of Holy Rosary Church.

Known especially for her historical novels, Miss White was chosen to receive the honor on the basis of intellectual, cultural and social contributions to American life, in keeping with the Catholic ideals of the Newman movement.

HE WAS GRADUATED from St. John's University Law School, New York, last June.

As a committee staff member, Kesselring will serve as assistant to S. Stanley Kreutzer, committee counsel. The committee is conducting an inquiry into alleged irregularities in present legislative practices.

Kesselring, while at St. John Fisher College, conducted by Basilian Fathers, was editor-in-chief of *The Pioneer*, student newspaper; secretary-treasurer of the Roff Guild, dramatic society; a member of the Student Board of Governors, and a staff member of the first college year-book.

He served on the editorial staff of the *St. John's Law Review* while at the New York law school conducted by the Vincentian Fathers.
