Corning Parochial School Remodeling Scheduled

Corning — Work on remodeling and renovating of the north building of St. Mary's parochial school is expected to start in the near future, subject to approval of bids.

The low bid for the general contract was entered by W. E. Granger & Sons of Elmira. Other low bids came from John C. Dineen of Corning; Harry E. Rising of Corning; and C. P. Evans of Corning.

The bids were opened at the office of the architects, Considine & Haskell, at Elmira. Amounts of the low bids and names of those entering higher bids were not made public.

FATHER MUCKLE MARKS GOLDEN JUBILEE

Rev. Joseph T. Muckle, C.S.B., the oldest American Basilian Father, celebrated his 50th anniversary in the Congregation of St. Basil on Aug. 13 in Toronto. He is the first American Basilian to mark his golden jubilee.

The day of his golden jubilee, Father Muckle spent quietly for he was on his annual retreat with the Toronto Basilians.

Father Muckle has three brothers who are priests: Rev. John F. Muckle, pastor emeritus of St. Thomas Church, Troy; Rev. Charles E. Muckle, pastor of St. Agnes Church, Avon; and Rev. William Muckle, pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Toronto. Their sister is Sister Mary Charles Muckle of the Sisters of Mercy. Their home is in Stanley, N.Y.

THE JUBILARIAN was born in 1887 in Stanley, professed in 1908 and ordained in 1915.

Professor of Medieval Latin Literature at the Institute of Medieval Studies at the University of Toronto. Father Muckle assisted in the establishment of the periodical, "Medieval Studies" to which he was a contributing author as he is now.

Father Muckle also aided in bringing the Basilian Order into the Diocese of Rochester, during the time that Edward Cardinal Mooney, present Cardinal Archbishop of Detroit, was the fourth Bishop of Rochester.

THE BASILIAN Fathers now direct Aquinas Institute and St. John Fisher College in this Diocese.

Father Muckle also served as general councillor in the Congregation of St. Basil from 1932-36. He holds the honorary degrees of LL.D. from Assumption University and D. Litt. from the University of Western Ontario. He has been a member of the Royal Society of Canada for many years.

He has spent most of his religious life in Canada, with the exception of a few years spent at the order's high school in Houston, Texas.
