Nunda Sesquicentennial

'Altar' Takes First Prize

Nunda — The dint of many hours of hard work by seven members of Holy Angels Church, paid off in high dividends last Saturday during the sesquicentennial parade in this little town in Ontario County.

These seven parishioners of the church designed and built a float for the town parade during their spare hours — and it topped all other entries to win first prize before a gathering of 5,000 people.

THE REMARKABLE thing about the float's winning was that it represented a Catholic Church Sanctuary. Children were posed as ready for their first Holy Communion.

"My parishioners really did a wonderful job," Father Raymond G. Heisel, church pastor, said. "I was very happy for them that the float was awarded first prize and it showed me that the people in this town, most of whom are Protestants, have a sincere respect for the faith of their Catholic neighbors."

Putting in long hours of labor to construct the float were James Kellogg, Charles Somers, Hubert McMaster, Walter Walworth and the Mesdames Clara McCarty, Paul Byrnes and Stanley Zareczny.

"The children on the float were absolutely marvelous," Father Heisel related. "They were as serious about their business as if they really and truly were in church. We couldn't have gotten a better job out of professional actors."

"The people viewing the parade were visibly impressed by the float — as were the judges, obviously," Father Heisel said. "For some, I guess, this was the first time that they had ever seen a replica of a Catholic Church sanctuary."

The parade was the highlight of the observance of this town's 150th anniversary. Both town and county officials were represented for the occasion.
