

Two Head For Missions

Two Rochester-born people will head east and west in the next couple of months. Both will be bent on the same purpose—to bring Christianity to the natives of Asia and Africa.

HEADING FOR Pakistan will be Father Joseph Tierney, a Holy Cross Father, who was educated at Blessed Sacrament School and Aquinas Institute.

Marlette Wickes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Wickes of 115 Deerfield Dr., will go to Africa where she will help set up a Grail Lay Apostolate Center in Urundi, where she will work in cooperation with the White Fathers.

THE SON OF Mr. and Mrs. M. Joseph Tierney, who formerly lived on Crossman Ter., and now in Bayville, L.I. Father Tierney is visiting his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Michael J. Tierney at 35 Klinek Rd., Brighton.

He has just returned to this country after spending five years engaged in missionary work in Pakistan. He will return to Pakistan next March.

The work of conversion among the Garo aborigines people who inhabit the territory he covers is a tremendous physical ordeal, Father Tierney said.

"These people are nomadic Mongolians, 80 percent of whom are Moslems," he said. "I have had to learn the Bengali and Garo languages in order to speak to them."

WHILE HE IS in Rochester, Father Tierney is seeking funds to help in the conversion of the people he meets in his territory, which covers several thousand square miles.

"What we need most is a 16 or 35 mm. movie camera to show pictures," he said. "This is the only way we can get an audience."

Father said that when they have a movie to show and means to show it, the missionaries can get a crowd of about 5,000 people viewing the film.

"Under these circumstances," he related, "we had to think of a way we could accommodate the people. We finally set up a sheet on bamboo poles and sat the natives on both sides of the screen so it could be seen from either side."

FATHER TIERNEY is also seeking other things for his people. These include religious films, tape recorders, slide projectors, a generator and a jeep.

"The jeep would really be useful to aid us in getting around our territory," Father Tierney said.

Right now, it takes the missionaries almost three months to cover their territory and the over 30 mission stations in that space.

"This means that the natives only hear Mass about four times a year," he said. The missionaries live in each village for about a week and then return to the mission center at Myrnsangh, the second largest city in East Pakistan, which is in the Dacca Diocese.

THERE ARE a total of 40 Holy Cross Fathers in East Pakistan about 100 miles from Calcutta.

Father Tierney was inspired to join his order through a poster on display at Aquinas. After graduating from the Devey Avenue school he was trained at Notre Dame and ordained in 1950. He said his first Mass at Blessed Sacrament.

MISS WICKES intention to leave for Africa next month is the culmination of her preparatory work with the Grail movement.

It was while she was at Nazareth College that she became interested in the movement and after receiving her bachelor's degree in sociology in 1945, she went to work for them.

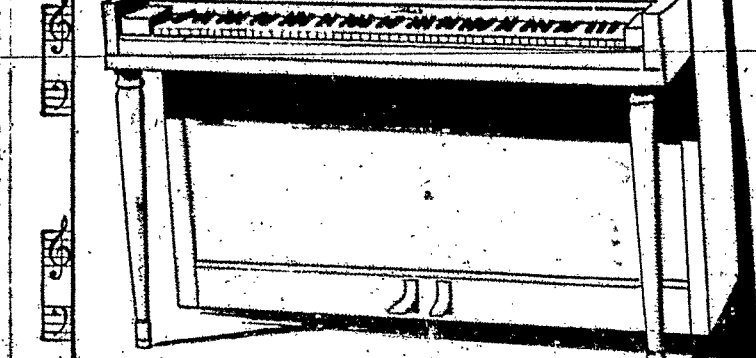
PRIOR TO THIS, Miss Wickes who also went to Nazareth Academy elementary and high school helped establish the Grail Center in Philadelphia and for three years headed the Detroit Grail Center.

In Africa, Miss Wickes will set up a Grail center which will train native lay leaders for apostolic work among their own people.

THE WHITE FATHERS who work the territory appealed for help in the training of lay catechists in this region. There is a total population of over 4.5 million people in Urundi and the White Fathers have had 63,000 converts in the last five years.

"Nazareth College inspired me to work as a lay apostle and I decided to join the Grail movement after I heard several talks by Grail workers," Miss Wickes said.

Miss Wickes is the first Rochester Diocese lay woman to go to Africa, where she will work about five years. She will work under the spiritual guidance of Bishop Perraudin of Kabgayi Diocese and Bishop Grault of Kitale Diocese.

Bishop Kearney Lays Cornerstone For New College

Bishop Kearney laid the cornerstone for the two-million dollar Catherine McAuley Junior College building this week. Work is under construction on the Sisters of Mercy Motherhouse property on Blossom Road.

The ceremony was witnessed by members of the clergy, the Sisters and friends of the community.

IN HIS TALK at the ceremony Bishop Kearney said "It is especially significant that today is the feast of Our Lady of Mercy."

"We have always gone to her with our pleas for this community. Now we come again to ask her blessing on this college for the training of Sisters for our classrooms. We can be sure she will again prove a 'Lady of Mercy' in this work to advance God's glory."

The Bishop concluded, "May Sisters who come forth from this school be worthy of the magnificent Mercy tradition, and of those who have gone forth to join the 'great Teacher'."

THE THREE-STORY structure, scheduled for completion in August of 1959, will house the junior college classrooms, a reading room, laboratory, administrative offices and novices' quarters, according to Mother Mary Magdalene, mother general of the order in the Rochester diocese.

The cornerstone laying was preceded by a Solemn High Mass at which the Bishop presided. The Mass was offered for the Sisters of Mercy in honor of their traditional feast this Wednesday, Our Lady of Mercy, by Rev. Richard Torrey, chaplain at the Mercy Motherhouse celebrant, Deacon was the Rev. Albert Simonetti and sub-deacon Rev. John Redington.

Rev. John Whalen and Rev. Joseph McDonnell were the deacons of honor. Rt. Rev. Monsignor John E. Marney was the assistant priest. Masters of ceremonies were Reverend Fathers Edward McAniff, James Marvins and Daniel Brent.

INVITATIONS were issued to seniors in all of the Rochester and area Catholic high schools, whose names have been sent in as prospective college students.

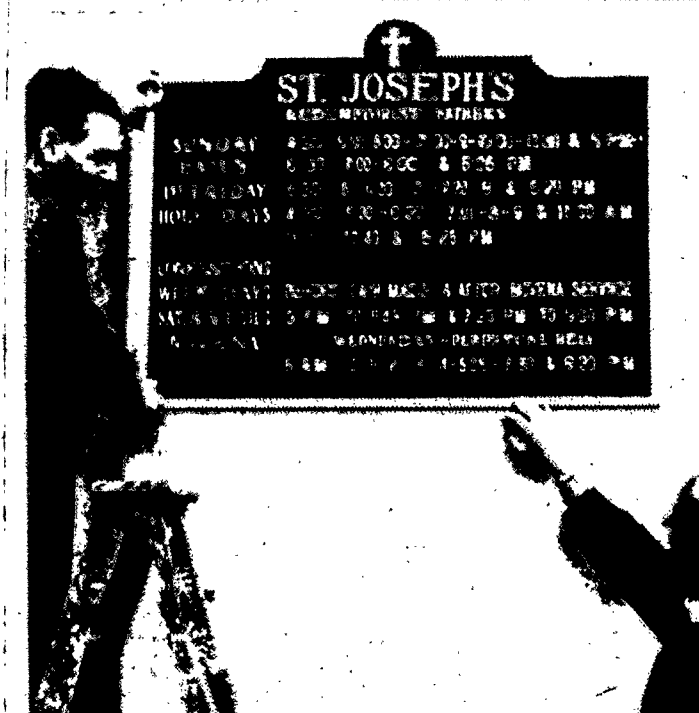
