## Grade School Regents End In Diocese

Catholic elementary schools of the Rochester Diocese will no longer give New York State Regents examinations, Monsignor Charles V. Boyle, diocesan superintendent of schools, announced today.

High schools will continue the Regents tests, however, he said. Pupils in the elementary schools will take tests designed by Catholic school officials.

ALL EIGHT dioceses in New York State have made the same decision to end Regents testing, Monsignor Boyle stated.

The decision was reached by the New York State Council of Catholic School Superintendents after consultation with the New York State Education Department.

Monsignor Boyle said the courses of study in use in each diocese have been planned and constructed to utilize the resources of the Catholic philosophy of education and develop in the child "those attitudes, skills and habits which are necessary for Christian living in our American democratic society."

THESE COURSES also meet all the requirements of New York State laws and the regulations of the New York State Education Department, he said.

The testing programs developed for Catholic Schools in this state have been planned by experts in the field of testing and have enjoyed the technical assistance of the Division of Examinations and Testing, New York State Education Department.

Diplomas issued by each diocese at the conclusion of the eighth grade will continue to bear the approval of the New York State Education Department, Monsignor Boyle said.

## Nazareth College Will Participate In TV Course

Nazareth College of Rochester will participate with over 250 colleges across the country in a TV course "Physics for the Atomic Age" on the television network of the National Broadcasting Company.

It is designed for the liberal arts colleges, high school teachers, gifted high school students, engineers and those adults interested in a better understanding of the developments in the world of science. The course will give undergraduate credit.

THE NATIONAL teacher for the course will be Dr. Harvey E. White, professor of physics at the University of California who will be seen on the NBC-TV (WROCTV Channel 5 in Rochester and WSETV Channel 5 in Elmira) network each morning from 9:30 to 10 a.m., beginning Oct. 6. Those who are enrolled will attend sessions scheduled at the college with Sister Geraldine, professor of physics.

Demorstration and experiments, participation by a group of expert physicists as consultants, reading assignments, problem solution and a final test at Nazareth are all features of the course.

## Langie Addresses Fund Workers

Auburn-Citing the changing times in which we live, Louis A. Langie of Rochester, posed two pertinent questions to campaigners in the United Fund Campaign for \$233,301 now being solicited.

Langie, president of Langie Fuel Service, Inc., Rochester addressed a kick-off meeting of the major firms, small business and industry, finance and commerce divisions at Auburn Inn, Sept. 30. Invocation was given by Monsignor James D. Cuffey, administrator of St. Mary's Church, Auburn.

The speaker explained that population increase calls for increase in social service to keep sound "the social and moral fiber of our communities." He said devaluation of the dollar requires more dollars to underwrite the cost of the necessary social, health and welfare programs of our cities.

THE YOUTH situation, he said, is emphasized by the increase in Cayuga County boys and girls scouts from 2,100, ten years ago to 3,500 today. Grave problems of juvenile delinquency and youth crime require careful study and skilled social service, he said.

Breakdown in family life resulting from poor housing, desertion, divorce threatens the normal psychological development of the children, he said.

To combat these threats to a community, trained social workers and adequate institutions are needed. More money is needed to secure the type of social workers required.
