

## Requiem Mass Offered For William McCarthy

Funeral Mass for William E. McCarthy, former Aquinas Institute and Niagara University athletic coach, authority on sports, and developer of boys was offered in Old St. Mary Church, Tuesday, Sept. 30.

Mr. McCarthy of 517 University Ave. died Saturday, Sept. 27, 1953. His death brought sorrow to a wide variety of men in all walks of life who had been influenced by his tireless interest in athletics and boys' work.

Solemn Mass of Requiem was celebrated by Monsignor James C. McAniff assisted by Rev. Jerome F. Schmitt, deacon and Rev. L. John Hedges, subdeacon. In the sanctuary also were Monsignor Richard K. Burns and Rev. Richard J. Orlando.

**MEN WHO** as high school students were coached to national fame in basketball were bearers. Members of outstanding Aquinas teams of the 1920's, they were Mortimer Leary, Leo Sullivan, John (Flip) Riley, Joseph Kennedy, Thomas (Bud) Mason and John (Ske) Flynn.

Mr. McCarthy was prolific in dispensing information on sports. He wrote books, did sportscasting and was always on call for historical data. In the early 30's he voluntarily wrote a sports column for the Catholic Courier Journal.

He served as basketball coach at old Cathedral High and Rochester High School under the Rev. John E. Napier, then principal. He continued at Aquinas Institute under Monsignor William J. Byrne and Monsignor Joseph E. Grady when the school moved to Dewey Ave.

National renown was achieved by the court team he coached in 1924 which set up a world's record. It is believed when the team defeated Cathedral High of St. Louis, 30 to 0. The 1925 team also came within two games of winning the National Catholic Tournament in Chicago and the 1926 team advanced to the finals to lose out by an 18-16 decision to Xavier High of St. Louis.

Mr. McCarthy's work in conducting a boys camp in industrial athletic enterprises and at

Rochester Business Institute where he was a student counselor, were being recalled this week.

A veteran of World War I in which he was wounded by shrapnel in Europe, he joined the National Catholic Community Service as director of the USO in Portland, Maine in World War II. He wrote the official history of the 308th Field Artillery in World War I.

Mr. McCarthy is survived by his wife, Helen Rinn McCarthy; his daughter, Helen Ann McCarthy; one sister, Mrs. Ulahee Caler, Fairport; his aunt, Florence A. McAnaney; and his niece Rosemary Caler, Fairport.

Blessing at the grave was imparted by Monsignor Grady, a life long friend, in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery. Arrangements were by Hedges Memorial Chapel, University Ave.

## GOD LOVE YOU!

ONE DARK DAY after our First Parents were expelled from Paradise, Adam was walking with his two sons, Cain and Abel. As they passed the wreck and ruin of Eden Adam pulled his boys a little closer to him and with a nod of his head toward the Garden said: "Boys, that's where your mother ate us out of house and home."

THIS STORY does not tell the true dignity of woman. If it was a woman who tempted us from Eden, it was also a woman who with the "slimy treachery of her eyes, tempts us back to Paradise." The incarnation was announced to a virgin; the Redemption to a woman who was a sinner. Let those who would deny her role in salvation remember her supreme dignity. A woman was closest to the Cross on Good Friday; a woman was first to the tomb on Easter morn.

OUR PROBLEM in Mission lands is to give dignity to women. Moslem women can be divorced with a word from a husband. Only the message of Christ can give her status as a lineal descendant of the Woman through whose portals of the flesh came the Redeemer of the world. In Africa, girls have little freedom in choosing their partners. Parents demand exorbitant "bride-prices" and sell them to the highest bidder.

OUR MISSIONARIES held a World Union of Catholic Women's Organizations in Toga, Africa. Brilliant observations were made by some of the well educated African Catholic women. Dr. Agney of Ghana said: "One who educates a man educates an individual; one who educates a woman educates a family and a nation." A Sister was greeted with thunderous applause when she said: "In Africa, which is marching ahead, men will govern and women will reign."

SOME CATHOLIC WOMEN in the United States have responded beautifully to the plea of women in other parts of the world. A woman in Cleveland, whenever she went to the bakery to buy desserts for the family would omit her own and put the few cents sacrifice into a little bag for the Missions. Another woman with tuberculosis would sell her sewing for the Missions. Both of them sent their sacrifices to the Holy Father through his Society for the Propagation of the Faith. Wisely they knew that the Vicar of Christ would allocate their sacrifices where it would do the most good.

## Sodalities Hold Workshop

Adult and teenage Sodalities held their annual Sodality workshop at Sacred Heart Cathedral on Sunday, in conjunction with the observance of the 10th anniversary of the Apostolic Constitution, Bis Saeculari, issued by Pope Pius XII.

The constitution outlined the present program of the Sodality of Our Lady of an active apostolate and former the basis of the workshop, which was attended by 250 Sodalists from the Diocese.

BIS SAECULARI has become known as the magna carta of Sodalities. In it, the Pope set down 12 characteristic marks that are distinctive of and must be found in every Sodality of Our Lady throughout the world. He declared Sodalities to be true Catholic Action.

The workshop held at the Cathedral parish included special sessions for directors, for officers and unit leaders of teenage groups and for officers and members of adult Sodalities.

Purpose of the program, Father Edward E. Steinkirchner, diocesan director of parish Sodalities, said, was to help solve the practical problems involved in running a Sodality.

## Father Lane Says Requiem For Brother

Rev. John F. Lane, 47, victim of a 1953 auto accident, died Tuesday, Sept. 30, in St. Mary's Hospital, Galveston, Texas.

His brother, Rev. James C. Lane, pastor of St. Aloysius Church, Auburn, celebrated the funeral Mass yesterday (Oct. 2) in St. Mary's Church, Texas City, Texas.

Father John Lane was named pastor of that church in 1947. Previously he was an assistant pastor at Amundson Church, Houston.

A native of Auburn, he attended St. Mary's parochial school, Auburn high school, St. Bernard's Seminary, and LaPorte Seminary, Galveston, Texas, where he was ordained in 1933.

BESIDES HIS priest brother, he is survived by two brothers, Dr. Joseph A. Lane, prominent physician and surgeon of Rochester; and Luke E. Lane of Syracuse. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Luke J. Lane.

Father Lane, in addition to parish duties, also served as chaplain of a Houston Catholic War Veterans Post, as a director of the Catholic Youth Organization and as Newman Club chaplain at the University of Houston and at Rice Institute. During World War II he was a Coast Guard chaplain.

He was critically injured in an auto accident Oct. 16, 1953 and has been hospitalized since that time. Burial was in the priests' plot at the Dickinson Cemetery near Texas City.
