THIS STORY does not tell the true dignity of woman. If it was a woman who tempted us from Eden, it was also a woman who with the "starry treachery of her eyes, tempts us back to Paradise.". The incarnation was announced to a Virgin; the Redemption to a woman who was a sinner. Let those who would deery her role in salvation remember her supreme dignity. 


