'Not Alone In Red Prison' Jesuit Describes Treatment

Hornell — Realization of the true meaning of the Mys-tical Body of Christ came to the Rev. John Havas, S.J., with a tremendous impact in a Chinese Communist prison duncion.

The Jesuit missionary described the force of that knowledge Sunday to members of the Elmira Curia of the Legion of Mary at a Day of Recollection in Hornell. Approximately 50 Legion of Mary members from Elmira, Corning and Hornell attended the spiritual exercise in the pun-er room of St. Ann's School and in St. Ann's Church.

FATHER HAVAS, presently assigned to McQuinn Jesuit High School in Rochester, devotes his time to mission and retreat work. He spoke to the Legion of Mary members of his own ex-periences which resulted from his affiliation with the Legion of Mary in Shanghai.

His spiritual leadership of the Shanghai organization, was that of the 15 captives brought against him which resulted in his imprisonment from 1952 until 1954.

It was while he was in prison by five feet tall "very blue" grave," that Father Havas re-alized he was not alone. Through his complete dedication to the Mother of God and through the God Himself, Father Havas saw the true meaning of the Mys-tical Body of Christ to him with the tremendous force.

AS A CHINESE Communist prisoner, brainwashing was con-stant and horribly effective. Fa-ther Havas discovered. He said, "It is a terrible thing to be brainwashed. Only a Divine force can challenge it. My

THE COMMUNISTS terming the Legion of Mary a "subver-sive reactionary organization" ordered each of its members to register and to renounce the or-ganization.

To expedite what they antici-pated would be mass denials and renunciations, 38 places were designated in Shanghai where Legion of Mary members might sign. Not one member renou-nced the organization, Father Havas said.

"Many still are in prison in China today — some may have died since I left but still they have courageously refused to renounce their faith and the Legion of Mary," he said.

He added that many are for-mer students at Catholic Univer-sity in Shanghai where Father Havas taught modern languages. The Communists who con-quered everything so easily, had not figured on a spiritual force such as the Legion of Mary. Fa-ther Havas said. He declared that if the Catholic Church sur-vives in China, the Legion of Mary should be canonized.

Father Havas who came to the United States in 1954, still has vivid memories of his missionary work in China where he went as a volunteer in 1936. Of all the years of deprivations, and hardships one fact stands out as the most suffering he said, be-cause it is true.

HE HEARD from a Commu-nist questioner while he was in prison. The Communist laughed when Father Havas told him that the Catholic faith was the true religion. He then taunted him with this remark:

"You say you have the truth, yet you have only three and a half million members in China. We have not been in existence for 2,000 years as your Catholic faith has but in our short time we have 650 million Commu-nists."

Praying for more zealous Catholic action through realiza-tion of the Mystical Body, Fa-ther Havas concluded:

"God needs you as His in-struments. Only with His Mother's help can you be worthy for Him to see through your eyes, hear with your ears, work with your hands, walk with your feet and love with your heart."

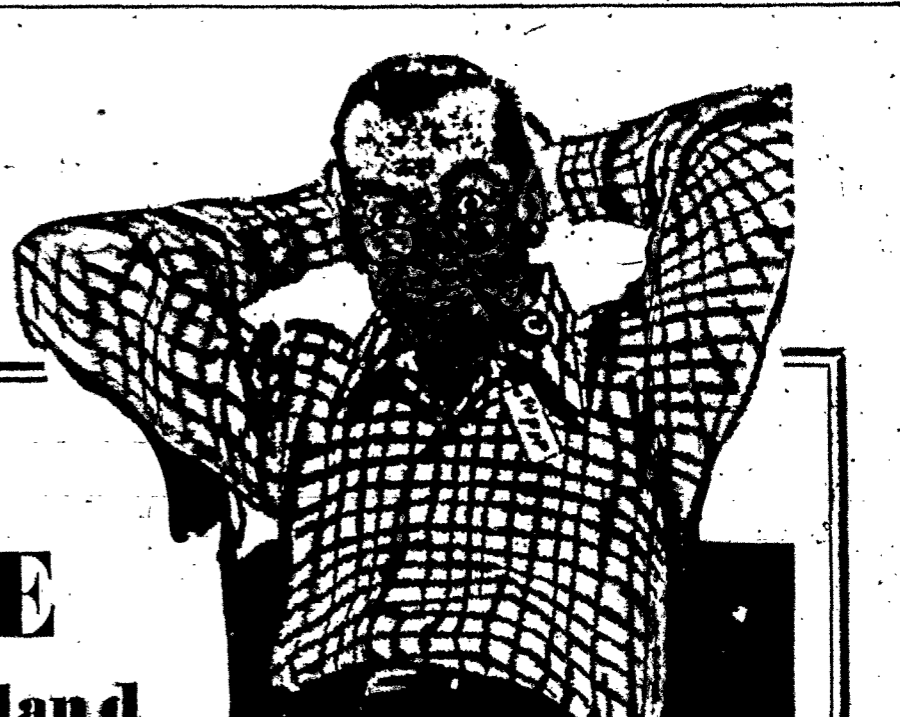
