The public is invited to inspect the recently completed \$800,000 addition at Holy Angels Home, 1326 Winton Rd. N., on Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 18 and 19, from 1 to 6 p.m.

Eugene R. Cusker and Mrs. Lynn French, co-chairmen of the open-house, said that members of the Holy Angels Guild will act as guides on both days.

The building was completed only this month after a year of construction program which started last October.

THE EDIFICE WILL be used as a monastery for the Sisters of Our Lady of Charity of Refuge who staff the home and as an addition for the school where 75 students are taught.

The building includes a chapel, living quarters, four classrooms and a recreation room. Mother Mary of the Immaculate Conception is superior of the home where special education and training is provided for teenage girls in need of guidance.

Scholarship Test Planned By KC

Thirty college scholarships valued at \$30,000 will be offered by the New York State Council, Knights of Columbus in the United States.

Mark L. Dalton, chairman of the state K of C Scholarship committee, announced.

A candidate for the preliminary examination must be a Catholic, reside in the State of New York and expect to be graduated from a recognized four-year Catholic or public high school in either January or June 1959.

DEADLINE for applications will be Dec. 1. Blanks are available in all public and Catholic high schools and local councils of the K of C, or by writing to Dalton, 34 Cleveland Ave., Onondaga, N.Y.

Ten scholarships, valued at \$1,400 each, will be awarded to the top nine candidates from each of 10 scholarship districts in the state. These 90 students then will take the college entrance examination board tests on March 14, 1959, at which time the 30 winners will be determined. This latter test, all conducted by the college entrance board, will be an examination in scholastic achievement (English, composition, intermediate mathematics and social studies).

Nazareth Plans New Program

Nazareth College students are taking another positive step toward world peace and international understanding. At the student hour assembly next Thursday, Oct. 16, the college ambassador program will be presented to the entire student body.

Feature of this program, which is one phase of "The Experiment in International Living," is the sending by individual groups, such as Nazareth College, a student representative to some foreign country each year during summer vacation.

So far 15 colleges and universities in the United States have adopted this program. Nazareth College is the first Catholic college to give consideration to participating.

SPEAKERS at the Thursday program at Nazareth will be students from the New York State Teachers College at Geneseo, one of the participating colleges. Josephette Cochrane, who spent a Summer in Austria and Patricia Albro, who was in Switzerland last Summer. International students on campus including newcomers to America will wear native dress and a tea at which international crochets will be served following the assembly.

These college ambassadors live for one month with a carefully selected host family in one of the countries to which groups are sent - Norway, Denmark, Sweden, Finland, Germany, France, Spain, Italy, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, Poland, Greece, Turkey, Israel, England, Scotland, India, Nigeria, Mexico and Chile.

The second month the students spend on a trip through the country, visiting its famous sites and scenic spots, usually accompanied by a member of the host family.

ON THEIR RETURN to the college, the ambassadors share their experiences with the student body by showing slides, pictures and speaking of her adventure at an all-college assembly and various club meetings.

The ambassadors are chosen by a committee of students with two faculty advisors. To be eligible, the candidates must be 18 years of age, in good health, an exemplary American, must have studied the language of the chosen country for two years within the preceding two years, and must be interested in human
