## 'Love God, Man' Newman Club Delegates Told

About 70 student delegates, representing most of the 56 colleges and universities in New York State, heard that the only real motive that should inspire all Newman Club work is the "Love of God and Love of Neighbor."

This was the theme of Rev. Charles W. Albright, C.S.P., in his keynote address at the opening of the leadership conference in Elmira last weekend.

FATHER ALBRIGHT, executive secretary of the National Newman Club Federation, quoted Leon Bloy's remark that "the almost unpardonable sin is doing the right thing for the wrong motive," because it involves hypocrisy and insincerity.

Newman Club leaders should not seek the praise of the chaplain and prestige on the campus, but keep always in mind that their efforts are for Christ and His Church.

On Saturday morning, Father Albright explained that the local club is incorporated in the official work of the Church through the National Newman Club Federation, a division of the Youth Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference. The delegates devoted most of Saturday in various studentled discussions related to the organizing and directing of Newman Clubs.

REV. WILLIAM A. BUENS, pastor of St. Anthony's Church, was guest speaker at the Saturday banquet.

He pictured for the Newmanites the leadership school of Christ and His Apostles. He pointed out the values evident from the Scriptures that Christ sought in choosing His leaders, the Apostles.

"They were not absolutely poor and illiterate," said Father Buens, "as many like to say. They were men of their times, but they possessed positive, sometimes impetuous generous characters."

"They knew what they had to do and, with the grace of God, they took definite, positive action. If you would be a Catholic leader, you must first be a real follower of Christ."

## Scholarship Test Planned By KC

Thirty college scholarships valued at \$30,000 will be offered by the New York State Council, Knights of Columbus, to help defray tuition or other expenses in any Catholic college in the United States.

A candidate for the preliminary examination must be a Catholic, reside in the State of New York and expect to be graduated from a recognized four-year Catholic or public high school in either January or June 1959.

DEADLINE for applications will be Dec. 1. Blankets are available in all public and Catholic high schools and local county offices of the K of C, or by writing to Dalton, 324 Cleveland Ave., Onondaga, N.Y.

Ten scholarships, valued at \$1400 each, entitle the winners to receive \$350 each year. Twenty scholarships are valued at \$800 each and entitle the winners to receive \$200 each year. Awards will be made as the result of a series of two competitive examinations, the first to be conducted Jan. 10, 1959. This will be the regular college entrance test in scholastic aptitude.
