Nazareth Plans New Program

Nazareth College students are taking another positive step toward world peace and international understanding.

Feature of this program, which is one phase of "The Experiment in International Living," is the sending by individual groups, such as Nazareth College, a student representative to some foreign country each year during summer vacation.

So far 15 colleges and universities in the United States have adopted this program. Nazareth College is the first Catholic college to give consideration to participating.

Speakers at the Thursday program at Nazareth will be students from the New York State Teachers College at Genesee, one of the participating colleges.

These college ambassadors live for one month with a carefully selected host family in one of the countries to which groups are sent - Norway, Denmark, Sweden, Finland, Germany, France, Spain, Italy, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, Poland, Greece, Turkey, Israel, England, Scotland, India, Niger, or Mexico and Chile.

First Saturday Club Hears Father O'Brien

More than 100 women heard Father O'Brien, assistant pastor of St. Peter and Paul's Church, explain the Eucharistic Legion by the Eucharistic Legion on the last Saturday.

Father O'Brien, speaking for the third consecutive year at the October meeting, said in part: "On the night before he died, Jesus pleaded for a special, heartfelt favor when He said: 'Could you not than watch one hour with Me?'"

"Since then, men and women of all generations have answered His favor by offering monthly, weekly and frequent holy hours. On May 24, 1955, by a canonical decree, Cardinal Gilroy gave juridical status to this movement by establishing it as a pious union having as its title 'The Eucharistic Legion.' Bishop Kearney gave his approval on April 17, 1955.

"The active members of the legion promise to remain in adoration before the Blessed Sacrament for one hour daily. The time of the hour is left each day to the convenience of the member. If there is a sufficient reason, the Holy Hour may be divided into different sections."

Continuation Care Unit To Open At St. Joseph's

St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira, will open a continuation care unit on Oct. 12. The purpose of the unit is to provide a concentrated care for patients considered to have an unpredictable length of hospital stay and requiring minimum medical and nursing care.

The nursing staff will consist of a Sister head nurse, registered professional nurses, licensed practical nurses and nursing aides.

Patients in the unit will be visited by their attending physician weekly or as needed. An intern will be on call on a 24-hour basis.

Transfer of patients to and from the unit shall be dictated by medical needs upon recommendation of the director of nursing and approval of attending physician.

Both plans are administered by the teachers insurance and annuity association.

The total disability program gives a full time, lay, academic or administrative member of the staff one-half of his salary after six months disability. Payment continues until retirement age at which time the member's retirement payments replace the disability payments.

THE MAJOR MEDICAL plan with a \$100 deductible clause is on a 20 per cent co-insurance basis. \$15,000 of insurance is provided and an extra \$15,000 for

each member of a dependent unit where the staff member's family is also insured.
